SEBI in exercise of powers in terms of Exit policy cannot derecognize CSE and for that matter any stock exchange. Formation of opinion is a pre-requisite for SEBI to invoke the provisions of SCR Act 1956 (Securities Contract Regulation Act 1956). The provisions in the Exit Policy do not conform with the requirements of section 5 of the SCR Act 1956. Therefore, SEBI in exercise of powers of this policy cannot derecognize CSE. Provisions invoked are Sec. 11 (1) and 11 (2) (j) of the SEBI Act 1992 - Decide.
10. The electric connection of Mohan Singh was checked by officials of the Punjab State Electricity Board and they found him committing theft of energy by bypassing the meter. A demand of Rs. 65,620 vide memo No:1582 dated 11.8.2009 as theft charges was raised. Hence, he filed a complaint before the Consumer Forum. The Electricity Board contended that a complaint against the assessment made by the Assessing Officer under Section 126 or against the offences committed under Sections 135 to 140 of the Electricity Act 2003 is not maintainable before a Consumer Forum - Decide.
