The modern legal education has become very challenging since the advent of the Information available from all dimensions through technology. It has become very crucial for the teachers to adopt new methods and strategies to teach students of law so that they can differentiate between the relevant information from the irrelevant available in the various internet sources. The students should be equipped with the authenticate source of information, for that there is a need for proper guidance to the students by the law teachers. In this background the role of teachers has become important to provide the update knowledge and information and also provide them guidance to think critically about the existing practice of law. The main teaching strategy should focus upon the student's independent thinking about critical analysis and self-learning. Interactive methods of teaching may help in this regard by encouraging interest in the law subjects and professions. Purpose of legal education today, must not be merely producing law graduates, but producing practice-ready law graduates. This may be achieved by revising the profession and they are aware of litigation and legal processes by the time they graduate. Clinical curriculum materials, chamber visit, court visit, mock trials, drafting legal opinion, RTI filings and PIL filings may be some of the proposed inclusion in the legal curriculum.

Legal Education can be imparted effectively only through good legal research. In this technological era, it is necessary for a law teacher to equip themselves with the modern tools and techniques of legal research. Research has to be promoted with the multi-disciplinary approach to enrich the critical analytical skills of the law teachers. This refresher course has been designed keeping in mind all the current situations that will provide the participants a new attitude towards development of methods of teaching in this area in addition to the innovative method of teaching, learning and research of law in general. This two-week refresher course is aimed at providing the Law Teachers to update their knowledge for best teaching methodology and practice materials, content analysis, presentation style to enhance teaching skills and promote discussion, to share the ideas and experience with fellow professors. The expected learning outcomes includes not just updating knowledge, but also how to translate it into teaching/learning modules in the respective subjects. Through exchange of experience, the course expects to adopt best practices and innovative methods in teaching and research in law. Psychology, as the study of thought, feeling, and behavior, enables psychologists to establish rapport with their clients and identify the root causes of their problems. Through support and guidance, psychologists empower their clients to discover solutions to their issues independently. If a client requires medical intervention, such as prescription medication, they are referred to a psychiatrist.

During her session, Kalyananthi placed significant emphasis on the importance of motivating and empowering students. By equipping them with problem-solving skills, fostering positive relationships, and providing the necessary support, educators play a crucial role in nurturing students' self-belief and personal growth.

Tax Policy and Administration

Ms. Saraswati S

Joint Director, Office of the Pr. Additional Director General, DG Systems, Chennai

Ms. Saraswati S, an expert in tax policy and administration, conducted an engaging session on the intricacies of tax law. She began by acknowledging the complex nature of taxation and

how it requires continuous updates on various acts, circulars, and government orders. As a revenue officer, she provided valuable insights into her role and responsibilities. Ms. Saraswati highlighted the paradigm shift in taxation, moving from a demand and supply approach to emphasizing voluntary compliance. She discussed the functioning of the GST (Goods and Services Tax) council and raised the question of whether the decisions made by the council hold binding or persuasive value. She explained that these decisions have no binding effect, as the council consists of representatives from both the central and state governments.

The session delved into the key principles of tax policies, providing participants with a comprehensive understanding of the laws prior to the implementation of the GST Act. Constitutional provisions, including the 101st amendment, were discussed, and Ms. Saraswati cited relevant cases for further reference. She also shed light on the GST (Compensation to States) Act of 2017, which plays a significant role in ensuring financial stability for the states. To make the concepts more accessible, Ms. Saraswati explained emerging concepts in tax administration, such as transitional credit, the role of technology in GST administration, the GSTN (Goods and Services Tax Network) portal, e-way bill, e-invoicing, composition levy, advance ruling, and the reverse charge mechanism. She simplified these concepts, enabling participants to grasp their practical implications. The session concluded with a question and answer session, providing an opportunity for participants to seek clarification and further explore the topics discussed.

Overall, Ms. Saraswati S's session on tax policy and administration provided valuable insights into the intricacies of taxation and the nuances of GST implementation. Her expertise and ability to simplify complex concepts ensured that participants gained a deeper understanding of the subject matter. Session I

Judicial Process

Prof. Dr. Raghunatha Reddy

Former Professor TNDALU, Chennai

Dr. Raghunatha Reddy, a respected resource person, delivered an enlightening session on the topic of Judicial Process. Prior to diving into the topic, Dr. Reddy emphasized the importance of research and motivated the participants to actively publish research articles and papers. The session commenced by highlighting that the judicial process is not solely a legal process but also an ethical and social process, playing a vital role in establishing legal order within

society. Dr. Reddy went on to explain the techniques of interpretation used in the judicial process. He discussed various case laws where historical interpretation was applied, highlighting the gradual shift towards contemporaneous interpretation by the courts. Drawing attention to the different legal systems, Dr. Reddy explained the characteristics of the common law and civil law systems. Under the civil law system, laws are explicitly drafted, and it is the responsibility of the courts to interpret them. To address the strictness of the common law, the equity law was developed, providing equitable remedies through chancery courts.

During the session, Dr. Reddy elaborated on significant concepts such as the doctrine of basic structure, constitutional morality, and the test of evil tendency. He discussed two important theories in judicial process: the declaratory theory and the creative theory. Additionally, he examined the decriminalization of homosexuality and adultery, illustrating how legal interpretations evolve over time. Dr. Reddy also emphasized the influential role played by progressive judges, such as Justice Krishna Iyer and Justice Bhagwati, in shaping poverty and prison jurisprudence. These judges contributed to the evolution of legal principles and played a significant role in advancing social justice. Lastly, Dr. Reddy shed light on the importance of Jurimetrics, a field that applies quantitative methods to resolve legal issues. He discussed how Jurimetrics aids in analyzing legal data and applying statistical tools to inform legal decision-making.

In summary, Dr. Raghunatha Reddy's session on the judicial process provided participants with a comprehensive understanding of the topic. - 5. Active Learning (1 mark): The extent to which the instructors encouraged student engagement and participation through interactive and collaborative learning activities was evaluated.
- 6. Questioning Techniques (1 mark): This criterion assessed the instructors' use of effective questioning techniques to stimulate critical thinking, check for understanding, and promote student engagement.
- 7. Assessment & Feedback (1 mark): The instructors' methods of assessing student learning and providing timely and constructive feedback on their progress were evaluated.
- 8. Closure (0.5 marks): This criterion focused on the instructors' ability to summarize key points, reinforce learning outcomes, and provide closure to the lesson.
- 9. Reflection & Adaptability (0.5 marks): The instructors' capacity to reflect on their teaching practices, make adjustments based on student needs and feedback, and demonstrate adaptability in response to unforeseen circumstances were assessed.

By using these criteria, the evaluators were able to provide a comprehensive assessment of the instructors' micro-level teaching approach. The evaluation process considered both the planning and delivery of the lessons, as well as aspects related to classroom management, student engagement, assessment, and adaptability. The weightage assigned to each criterion reflected its relative importance in determining the overall effectiveness of the micro-level teaching approach.

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
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
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
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
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Dr. Elumalai explaining Evolution of Legal AI Jurisprudence in India
