#### REPORT OF THE SPECIAL LECTURE

#### 6 YEARS OF GST AND THE WAY FORWARD



The Department of Taxation Law had organized a special lecture for the Post Graduate students of the Department of Taxation Law on 30<sup>th</sup> June 2023. The lecture was delivered by **Smt. S. Saraswathi, IRS, Deputy Director (Customs &GST)** person of knowledge and experience in the field of Taxation Law. The Special Lecture sought to understand and have a strong idea of the concept of GST.

The Seminar brought a basic knowledge of the topic among the students. Since the Lecture was on the "6 YEARS OF GST AND THE WAY FORWARD" the Resource person gave an overview of pre-GST laws such as VAT, Excise, Service Tax, CENVAT, Central Sales tax, countervailing duty, octroi, Entertainment Tax, how they subsumed in the GST was enunciated. Later the Speaker explained in detail the procedural aspects of GST with examples.



Later, the Speaker provided an overview of the challenges encountered in the taxation regime before the implementation of GST and the benefits gained by our economy after the implementation of GST. The speaker gave the students insight into how to access the GST portal and the importance of notifications and circulars issued by the CBIC (Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs).



Overall, it was a very interactive and comprehensive session and there was an overwhelming response from the students. It was a successful lecture and it has benefitted students at large.

### REPORT ON ONE DAY WORKSHOP ON PROCEDURAL COMPLIANCE UNDER GST - PROBLEMS AND PERSPECTIVES

The Department of Taxation Law, had organized a special lecture for the all the students of the School of Excellence in Law on the topic "PROCEDURAL COMPLIANCE UNDER GST - PROBLEMS AND PERSPECTIVES" conducted in commemoration of GST day on the 1<sup>st</sup> of July, 2023. The workshop was moderated by Ms. Mahimashree. A. The workshop was inaugurated by Prof. Dr. V. Balaji Sir, Dean and Head of the Department of Taxation, Mr. Balamurugan Sir by lighting the lamp and Mr. V. Balaji Sir, the Dean of the Tamilnadu Dr. Ambedkar Law university addressed the gathering on this day. The welcome address was delivered by Ms. S. Nivedha, Ph.D Scholar and the Theme of workshop was delivered by Ugarthi Shankalia. M, I year LLM from the Department of Taxation. The workshop consisted of two sessions.







SESSION 1 - ONE NATION ONE TAX ONE E-WAY BILL - A REALITY CHECK

The lecture by **Mr. Venkateshwaran**, Assistant Commissioner (GST) graduated with B.com degree from Pachaiappa's College, and he then pursued B.L. from Dr. Ambedkar Govt Law college, Chennai and later got his M.B.A degree in Financial Services from Anna University, Guindy. He has been Assistant Commissioner for the past 10 years and was conferred with Best Performance Award in 2019. He has also given guest lectures to the GST officials, Ministers and Students. Sir has a wide knowledge on indirect taxes and is here to enlighten all of us. He started the session with the concept of One Nation, One Tax and One E-Way Bill: A Reality Check. He began the lecture by giving us the basics of taxation where he emphasized on indirect taxes particularly GST.

The expert explained about the versatility of indirect taxes and has explained about the applicability of taxes in our day to day life. He gave an analysis on the growth of indirect taxes right from Value Added Tax to the present GST. Later he gave an outline on the mechanisms

present under GST especially with respect to Cross check mechanism. He explained the scenarios on how it is applied in check posts throughout Tamil Nadu and that after the enactment of GST the government has come to a belief that the people are civilized and that the Check posts are not necessary anymore. He also explained on how to study the tax invoice, the burden of proof on who



should prove the authenticity of the tax invoice and also the applicability of the Tax invoice while filing the returns.

The speaker dvelved into the topic of E-way bill. He emphasized on who all should use the E-way bill and also said that E-way bill can also be used as an evidence when a person acquires GST Registration. He explained various forms of E-way bill (EW-01) and the procedure to file them. It is particularly related to the interstate movement of goods. Inorder to determine the supply it is necessary for the tax professionals to know certain interpretation tactics. He clearly explained to the students on how the Department functions in these circumstances. The lecture was very

informative and also interactive and it helped the students in understanding the concept of E-way bill exhaustively.

#### SESSION 2 - SEAMLESS GST RETURN FILING AND ITC CLAIMS

The lecture for the second session was delivered by Advocate Mr. Ravindran Sir.

Mr. Ravindran, Advocate is an ex-department officer with 28 years of service in the Customs, Central Excise and Service Tax. He took voluntary retirement from service and started legal Consultancy in the name of Raghavendra Associates in the year 2003 and practices before High Court and Supreme Court. While in service, he was conferred the prestigious president's award for his distinguished record of service and devotion to duty, in the year 1989. He has conducted GST Seminars and as an advocates he guides and helps assesses, professionals and students like us on the compliance and procedure of the GST Law.

The speaker started the session by addressing the crowd Happy GST Day and begined with a quoted that "*Under the Sun every single Activity is taxed*". He said that the GST is derived from the central excise and sales tax excise act. He spoke about the importance of the role of GST during and after the COVID period. He also emphasized on the importance of filing the GST Returns in order to claim ITC. The session also included the subject perspective of the GST returns and taught us about section 7 which deals with supply, section 16 to 21 which tells about the concept of ITC. He also explained in detail about the sections 16, 16(2), 17 and 17 read with Rule 86A. He taught us section 17(5) which deals with exemptions. He listed the GST-R forms that are used for filing. He also explained about the practical aspects of the Advance ruling and also the admissibility of

ITC. The speaker kept the gathering engaged with his lecture and gave plenty of information on the GST returns both theoretically and practically.

The session was finally concluded by delivering the Vote of Thanks by Ms. A. Niranjanaa. Both the Sessions were enriching for the students and it ended with an interactive session between the

The Department of Taxation Law organized a One Day National Level workshop on the topic "**E-FILING OF INCOME TAX RETURN - PROCEDURES AND PROSPECTS**" conducted in commemoration of Income Tax Day on 24<sup>th</sup> of July, 2023.

#### **MODERATOR'S OPINION ON THE THEME**

#### Hon'ble Mr.Justice Mr.Jyothimani Palanichamy

The Hon'ble Mr. Justice Jyothimani Palanichamy presided as a moderator and expressed his views on the Sub-Theme, Green Tourism – One planet Network which he regards as an universal problem. The speaker stressed on the fact that

'human negligence works against nature' and further addressed issues of pollution, biodiversity and climate change with special emphasis towards Plastic reduction and maintenance of balance in the Marine Ecosystem. He also strongly advocated compulsory environmental education to be introduced from the nascent stages of children's education. He suggested two pronged approach viz., to restrict general public from forest interventions and to organize more awareness related programs to bring in change in the mind-set of the people. The moderator emphasized on the importance of safeguarding the environment for the future generations. He highlighted on the precautionary measures to be taken in order to avoid adverse effects on environment.

#### **OPINION OF PANELIST**

#### PANELIST (1): Dr.B.C.Archana Kalyani (IFS)

The Panel Member highlighted the active role played by the government of Tamil Nadu under the eco-tourism policy, 2017 was appreciated by pointing out the efforts taken to provide safe passage of winged visitors, identify Ramsar Sites, earmarking of Dugong Reserve. The speaker introduced the concept of unexplored hotspots of the Eastern Ghats which have the potential to be recognized as the ecotourism spots. Four such spots have been identified in the Eastern Ghats and one of the Western Ghats to be evolved as upcoming eco-tourism hotspots. The speaker highlighted that how such efforts would provide subsistence to the local population to reduce the carbon foot-print.

#### PANELIST (2): Dr.P.Velmurugan

The Panel Member has presented case studies to highlight the importance of eco – tourism in the world scenario in relation to the Indian context. He emphasized that Indian eco-tourism has a long way to achieve sustainable management in tourism sector. The Panelist stresses the areas that need to be regulated in eco-tourism which includes protecting the local culture, infrastructure development, providing a better livelihood for the local communities, responsibility of the tourist towards the use of non-biodegradable.

#### PANELIST (3) : Dr.Saroja lyer

Dr. Saroja lyer opined her views on the sub theme i.e., Travel for LiFE which is a programme under Mission LiFE (Lifestyle for Environment) introduced by the Ministry of Tourism, Government of India. It works in convergence with the pillars of National Strategy for Sustainable Tourism It aims to create mindful and deliberate utilization of resources by the stakeholders. She highlighted that the change is within every individual by changing simple actions in their daily life.

She suggested the following recommendations:-

- Use energy efficient appliances.
- Use public transport while travelling.
- Saving of electricity will reduce its demand which further reduces the production.
- Avoid Single Use Plastics.
- Carry Eco-friendly cutlery.
- Switch to renewable energy resources.
- Limit water consumption.

#### PANELIST (4) : Mr.Prasad M.P.

The author innovatively pointed out the idea of assigning green credits to incentivize the public for sustainable use of resources. The use of science and technology to develop eco-tourism has gained momentum and today we can use a simple device like a mobile to monitor and regulate the human presence in the habitat.

#### PANELIST (5): Dr. Venkatesan

The Panelist deliberated on the significance of the Eco-tourism sector, shedding light on the unique opportunities and challenges encountered in the sector. Ecotourism is a niche segment of tourism and is a vital component of sustainable development, reconciling responsible travelling with environmental conservation and community well-being. He recognized that Ecotourism is spreading positive impact on society nurturing the consciousness to preserve and maintain ecologically significant places with their natural essence intact. He elaborated on the synergy between ecotourism and heritage conservation, highlighting the impact of eco-tourism on supporting the local economy and traditions. Eco-tourism supports the local and indigenous populations in terms vi employment, business and cultural appreciation. Having deliberated on the positive side of eco-tourism, he brought forth the lesserknown negative effects of eco-tourism, touching upon the issue of commercialization of ecologically sensitive natural places. The tourism industry uses eco-tourism as a business model, resulting in overcrowding of such places. He further touched upon the UN Sustainable Development Goals which provides a framework for addressing sustainability issues. He has a brief account on the diverse landscapes and biodiversity hotspots of India which have huge potential for the eco-tourism sector.

#### **SUMMING UP BY THE MODERATOR:**

Eco tourism can be a positive way forward for sustainable travel and to achieve the 2030 Agenda. By encouraging responsible production and consumption, promoting awareness about the conservation of natural environment and providing

economy to the locals. The target of Mission LIFE aims to achieve 80% of all villages and urban local bodies in India to become eco-friendly by the end of 2028. The United Nations One Planet Sustainable Development Programme sets the agenda for sustainable consumption and production in the tourism sector, which will help to achieve the various Sustainable Development Goals of 2030. Also, the Global Tourism Plastics initiative asked the tourism sectors to make a set of actionable commitments by 2025 to reduce plastic pollution. The eco-tourism offers a way for people to enjoy and appreciate the beauty of nature while contributing to its preservation for future generations. By responsible and mindful tourism practices, it helps to protect natural resources, preserving biodiversity and cultural diversity, support participation of local communities, and raise awareness about environment conservation. Hence, tourism must be in such a manner as it does not affect the rare flora and fauna, unique sacred species, waterfalls, wild animals, etc., which together form the biodiversity heaven on our planet.

#### POINTS FOR POLICY RECOMMENDATION:

- ♦ Ecotourism potential is very high but requires careful planning and target oriented approach.
- Propose to have G20 countries Ecotourism pilot projects to share experience and to collaborative for ecotourism projects involving local communities and exchange for field visits by them.
- Special attention to link tourism and existing environment policies and awareness on environmental regulations Similar to Blue Flag beach certification Identify more ecotourism sites involving local communities and funding opportunism for local/NGOs educational or research institutions to involve directly/Evolve broader linkage to scientific studies to ecotourism to monitor and identify and evolve yearly ecotourism spot ranking.
- ♦ Globally climate crisis is worsening. Ecotourism can also be affected by this climate crisis. G20 countries are committed to fulfil the climate targets of the Paris Agreement and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs 2030). Ecotourism can support their attempt to minimize negative impacts upon the natural and socio-cultural environment.
- Strengthen existing environment Policies, Laws, regulations, best practices for ecotourism, nature-based tourism in which the main motivation of the tourists is the observation and appreciation of nature as well as the traditional cultures prevailing in natural areas educational and interpretation features.
- ♦ Propose to inculcate humanistic approach to reduce, reuse and recycle.

#### **PANELLIST OPINION ON SUB THEMES**

#### Multiple Stages of Clearance

There are multiple levels where clearance has to be obtained to initiate shooting; hence it requires more time and higher budget. Clearance approved at one level drains before approval from other officials, A one stop clearance from all stakeholders can sort this issue.

#### ♦ Lack of sufficient training in the modern marketing techniques

There is a marked disparity in the ability of the rural population in promotion of their natural resources. The indigenous people are perhaps most aware of the rivers and canyons, forests and fields in their neighborhood, but their awareness of these natural relics dies with their memory. While films may be a portal to communicate to the wider audience about these places and their captivating beauty, the film makers may lack knowledge of these places if it is not properly documented.

#### Over tourism

When a particular site becomes recognized by the public after it is shown in a movie, it creates a sudden spike in the number of people visiting the site. The sudden influx of audience leads to over tourism. Crowding of places robs the site of its innate beauty leading to a deficiency in the ability to capitalize on the benefits provided by these tourist sites

#### Atrocities of Local People

Local people and goons interrupt smooth conduct of shooting in many areas leading to irksome circumstances. This can be the plights and predicaments to others.

#### ♦ Lack of Professionalism in Projecting Indian Culture

There is lack of professionalism analogical to international standards. The portrayal of Indian culture, tradition, scenarios, places and people mindset can be better.

#### Lack of Government Consultation

The requirements of film tourism could be considered by the Government. They need to be heard, identified and sorted out. For the government and film industries, it is inevitable to consultative mechanism.

#### ♦ Lack of interest in sustainable use of tourist sites

The sad truth is that, once a tourist attraction has been identified there is a rigorous and violent exploitation of the site. With huge masses of people visiting the site to behold it's beauty in the initial days before the beauty fades, we find, that the once beautiful locations become polluted shortly after this spike in visitors occur. This calls for a global effort towards the exploitation of tourist sites.

#### Lack of funding for the creation of movies

A common challenge witnessed in the film industry is the lack of funding. Film makers who wish to showcase the architectural and natural marvels are often stumped in their efforts as they stand before the mighty giant of the 'money problem'. Governments should supports film makers by providing sufficient subsidies. Providing subsidies especially for filming in untapped heritage sites will have a double benefit of increasing the public knowledge of the heritage site, while also enhancing the film makers ability towards making good films, which in turn, increases the employment opportunities for the people involved in making the film.

## Increased taxes on the entertainment industry cripples any effort made in this area.

When a person decides to make a film, which in itself is an expensive project, he is also faced with other challenges. One of these challenges is the enormous burden of taxes. Taxes in the entertainment industry is one

extremely heavy which also acts as a stumbling block for film makers in various countries.

#### ♦ Poor maintenance of heritage sites

Heritage sites are a gem in the crown of any country. However, we recognize a regrettable trend that many of these sites lose their beauty over the generations because of poor maintenance. This at times may be due to the indifference of the authorities, but oftentimes, it is due to insufficient funding and appears to be a challenge demanding the attention of the leadership as cultural heritage sites are fixed assets, which can almost never be restored to it's initial beauty, thus, we recognize the adage of 'prevention is better than cure' and encourage the leadership of the various countries to enhance the maintenance of the heritage sites.

#### Seasonality of tourism destinations

The tourism industry also faces the challenge of seasonality of income. Many natural tourist attractions are unable to cater to the needs of the market in certain times of the year. For instance, it is a great hazard to be in the midst of snow-capped mountains during monsoon, consequently leading to a closure of the site, during this time of the year. Being a natural hurdle, which can expose lives to danger, this is a hurdle which is difficult to overcome.

#### SUGGESTIONS AND WAY FORWARD

♦ To improve vocational training among the people to help them in identifying and capitalizing their architectural and natural assets.

Identifying the challenge of insufficiency of knowledge amongst the indigenous people in the area of marketing, and the parallel, but equally significant lack of knowledge of the film makers about tourist sites in rural areas, it is expedient to create a link, a common platform for the film makers and the indigenous people to communicate, so that the indigenous people can capitalize on their regional tourist assets thus enhancing their economic condition, while the film makers are able to identify these places and share these places with the public, thus contributing towards development in the area of tourism.

#### Population control of visitors

It would be wise to impose a restriction on the number of visitors permitted to visit a tourist site regardless of the season. This prevents overcrowding while also protecting the site from being unsustainably exploited by the tourists.

#### ♦ To provide tax-breaks and subsidies for films based in rural sites.

When new heritage and natural sites are being portrayed in films, it is crucial for the government to encourage the efforts made by the film makers in promoting these sites. As such, it is pertinent to reduce the hurdles faced by the film makers. One of the ways to do this would be to reduce the taxes borne by the film makers, and by providing subsidies to enhance their interest in choosing these places to showcase in their film.

#### ♦ To promote social media discussions on the regions displayed in the films

Many times, a film may be made in an iconic destination creating an interest in the minds of the viewers to visit the location where the film was made. However, they may be unaware of this place, and overtime, are likely to forget of the beauty encased by this site. By using social media, the film makers can reach the viewers establishing a point of contact. But it may not always be feasible for one film maker to reach an international audience. Thus, it is suggested that the governments of various countries establish a portal through social media platforms, to help the viewers to identify these places and benefit from it's beauty.

# ♦ To adopt the 4-step method proposed by Bariach and Kotler on image management and other modern marketing tools.

In 1991, Barich and Kotler had presented a four-step image management process, with implied feedback. In this process, Barich and Kotler identified that image measures are useful as a planning as well as marketing tool. The first step is to assess the image of the destination. The assessment of the image entails two related parts: assessing the actual image, and assessing the target market's ideal image. The second step is to measure the image periodically and systematically. Third is comparing the actual measured image to the target market's ideal destination image to identify differences between the two. The fourth step is to develop strategies to address the identified differences. This strategy development step then feeds back to the first or second step in the process. However, this is just one of the methods which are suggested. And it is encouraged that the countries engage in proper efforts towards marketing these unexplored tourist sites by harnessing the various modern marketing methods available in the present day.

#### ♦ To encourage CSR activities towards the development and maintenance of heritage sites

The CSR activities of the companies have been restricted to certain limited spheres. However, the funds expended in CSR Activities are immense. It

is suggested that, The companies be allowed to channel their CSR funds towards the growth and development of natural sites as well as heritage sites.

#### ♦ Need for Collaborations with various stakeholders

There shall be consensus among different agencies of film making including logistics, hospitality and so on.

#### Need to harness power of modern technology

Need to harness power of modern technology such as virtual reality to facilitate tourism.

#### ♦ Insurance Policy

Insurance companies have started offering policies which shall be mandated for all film productions in upcoming days.

#### Re-creation of Monuments

Lost monuments can be re-created with the aid of Government or in Private Public Partnership model.

#### Enumeration of tourist places

Complete details of tourist / shooting / historical places shall be compiled, documented and made vividly available to all. Promotion and branding of places with specialities shall be done such as cleanest village, second highest rainfall area, village without main doors etc.,

#### Breaking Travel Barriers among G20 Nations

There shall be free movement without visa and other formalities among G20 nations for shooting purpose which will promote film tourism.

#### Providing better Infrastructure

Providing better infrastructure, restructuring existing film cities would be of help.

#### INTRODUCTION ABOUT THE SUB-THEME BY THE MODERATOR

- ♦ Tourism as a whole serves as a multi-functional tool to improve the economic development of a country and also helps to alleviate poverty in the country by providing employment opportunities.
- Rural tourism is one of the most upcoming types of tourism that has many advantages and also serves as an improvement to the livelihood of the people in rural areas.
- It also showcases a country's heritage as well as a cultural legacy to the whole world through the process of tourism
- The more advantageous tourism is, it also has its backdrops. This paper will be discussing the problems as well as provide relevant solutions, which can be followed by all the countries.

#### **INSTABILITY IN EMPLOYMENT DUE TO SEASONALITY IN TOURISM**

Seasonality has long been recognized as one of the most evident and significant characteristics of tourism, which is to some extent experienced by virtually every tourist destination in the world. As seasonality is reflected in the variations of tourist demand and hence labour demand, this phenomenon poses a particular challenge for employment provided under tourism sector. This type of employment can be correctly termed as seasonal employment.

Seasonality in tourism can be expressed through the number of visitors, expenditure of visitors, employment and admissions to attractions, etc. This states that seasonality affects all activities in the field of tourism.

This phenomenon is not unique only to a certain country or any other particular country, but to all the countries around the world. For example, let's say for a given period of time some destinations might have more visitors and tourists than expected during the on-season and remain unused during the off-season.

This problem can be solved by advocating different solutions.

- ♦ The seasonality in employment is categorized into two types, namely, institutionalized seasonality and natural seasonality.
- To respond timely and adequately to seasonal oscillations in demand, tourism organizations need to know and track the causes of seasonality.
- Different measures can also be used to measure seasonality such as seasonality range, ratio and coefficient of seasonal variation.

# RACIAL DISCRIMINATION STEREOTYPES AND THEIR IMPACTS ON CULTURAL TOURISM

Racism is increasingly recognized as a key driver of unfair inequalities in power, resources, and opportunities across racial groups. A comprehensive understanding of racism is beneficial to activist groups, policymakers, and governments.

This action provides a unique opportunity for researchers to effectively acquire quality data related to racism. Moreover, these tourism reviews come from different parts of the world, thereby helping alleviate existing limitations on data coverage.

# ADVANCEMENT OF CULTURAL TOURISM IN SPECIAL TARGET COUNTRIES

Before moving on to the main focus of the topic in motion, I would like to express my views regarding the special target countries. These are the countries which are subject to great rate of poverty, dearth of educational and employment opportunities and lack of capital.

The tourism sector is one of the most profitable non-technology-based-economic sectors and more so in case of these countries.

Prolonged existence of such problems may give rise to social and cultural exclusion. Without delving too much into the root causes of vexations, let's look at the solution. Possible re-arrangements in strategies and alternative policies on development and growth can foster the process of nation-building, keeping in mind the characteristics of these countries and the tourism industry can be a key player in the tourism industry.

Tourism may change a society by the process of diffusion of new cultures. However, a cultural change does not occur only by the direct impact of tourism on the host society. It appears that tourism is able to accelerate cultural change in a number of ways below.

- 1. The modification of the ecological function occupied by a society. Changes to the habitat of a society induce changes that may involve cultural adaptation and change;
- 2. The contact between two societies with different cultures may bring about changes in both groups;
- 3. The evolutionary changes occurring within a society. This refers to the process of adaptation where societies change in response to internal, ecological, and social needs to ensure satisfaction from their environment.
- 4. The interaction between these countries and guests leads to intercultural impacts in that society. Through intercultural communication, the effect of tourism can be a positive change in that country's culture. The contact between different social groups, nationalities, and cultures may contribute to the removal of social or national prejudices and the promotion of better understanding and positive social change.

# ARCHEOLOGICAL TOURISM: DISCOVERING SHARED CULTURAL HERITAGE

- (i) Collaborating with international organisations and experts to facilitate archaeological research and utilize archaeological tourism as a means to foster cultural dialogue and strengthen global connections.

- (v) This approach would empower indigenous communities to reclaim ownership of their heritage, fostering mutual respect and understanding while promoting responsible stewardship of cultural artefacts.

#### **MODERATOR'S OPINION ON THE THEME**

Dr. K. Nagarjuna, Founder, Annam Tours & Travels Private Limited was the Moderator for this panel discussion. He kindled the idea that "India has everything" and he wanted to promote the mesmerizing places of tourist destination in India which is no less than any other famous sites like Switzerland etc. around the world.

He emphasised on tourism sector before and after the impact of covid and how it has revived. Before the covid it was all about brand domination tourist activities but post covid it has become a lot more genuine to what it was. He wanted to promote beach tourism as we have a long coastal line which is the demographical advantage of ours.

#### **OPINION OF PANELIST**

#### PANELIST (1) : Ms. L. Maithili

The Panellist emphasized the proper analysis of the cost-effective method in tourism by the government especially in the MSME Sector and insisted that the Government has to provide technical guidance and skill training to the local and domestic people who are in the tourism field. Further, she insisted that, the rural youths have to be educated and trained for alternate income during season in tourist sites. She has insisted to promote organized tourism along with Public Private Partnership (PPP). She addressed environmental issues that need to be balanced in

promoting tourism. She emphasized on the recreation of the water bodies that would trigger tourism. She expects connectivity to be improved by linking waterways to metro.

#### PANELIST (2): Mr. D. Venkatesan

Dr. Venkatesan gave the introduction of tourism with MSME and its significance in detail by emphasizing on challenges of MSME such as accessing capital from public and private sources, lack of labor and management skills in marketing and promoting their services and waste water management and sanitation. Active participation of States is needed especially in the coastal states. Week-long Skilling programs have to be promoted across the country. He emphasized on less water consumption, waste management for the conservation of biodiversity, regulation of E-markets and online-digital platform businesses for all tourist sites. He exhorted to create an ecosystem for start-ups and to create awareness about policy destination capital credit to MSMEs.

#### PANELIST (3): Dr. M. Priyadharshini

Tourism industry is a rapidly growing sector that drives economic growth and employment opportunities and highlighted on sustainable tourism to have positive impact on livelihoods and to foster prosperity which delivers economic and social benefits. Also, how MSME plays a pivotal role in driving employment. Further, addressed the challenges like decent working conditions to harness economic growth and employment opportunities and how women, youth and migrant workers are affected. To conclude, every state has its own unique tourist destinations and thus requires its own stakeholders to function efficiently by developing strategies at district level.

#### PANELIST (4): Mr. Baskaran Krishnamoorthy

Touring and tourism are two different things. Tourism industry should work for the benefit of tourists and what added value can they offer to them. He addressed that foreign tourists experience commercial exploitation and pointed out that in national draft policy of tourism it has suggested for behavioural change and such development can happen only with vision of stakeholders and not the industry. While addressing the issues regarding employment he stated that as per national draft policy for tourism one in every three jobs will come from tourism industry.

#### **SUMMING UP BY THE MODERATOR:**

He was overwhelmed with the insights provided by the panellists and the involvement of the students and observers had towards the panel discussion. He

greatly appreciated the institutions idea of bringing tourism as the theme for the G20 Summit Simulation. He also recommended certain policy decisions by considering other panellist views.

#### **THEME: Wellness in Medical Tourism**

This growing trend merges medical procedures with relaxation, stress reduction, and personal growth activities, aiming to address medical needs as well as mental, emotional, and spiritual well-being. Popular destinations offer advanced medical facilities alongside opportunities for relaxation through activities like yoga, meditation, and spa treatments. Integrating high-quality medical care with hospitality services is crucial for the success of this trend. This combination not only addresses medical concerns but also equips travellers with tools for long-term health. The wellness aspect in medical tourism has gained momentum due to a rising awareness of holistic well-being and the desire for comprehensive healthcare experiences. In essence, it's a trend that recognizes the synergy between medical treatments and activities promoting overall well-being.

#### **MODERATOR'S OPINION**

#### DR. BALAMURALI

Dr. G. Balamurali has Moderated the panel with most of the insights on Indian medical tourism where he started with the statistics of the India on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Position in International Medical tourism next to Thailand. Further he presented the SWOT analysis of the medical tourism, where our countries strengths is Fast patients intake and the quality of medical facilities available, Weakness of Our Country is on the High commercial buffered cost on the pricing by the middlemen in foreign patients admission and the lack of visa processing is the most hindering obstacle of the finest medical system of India. The opportunities available to India is to connect within the country the available skilled doctors and regulated them in such a manner it doesn't need a middleman or a competitive market. This will create a collective growth of the medical facilities in India in Global Medical Tourism. The Threat of the Medical tourism is the developing the medical visa complications and the negative Perception of the Indian medial health facilities.

The Consent of the foreign patients should have multilingual forms and translators to assist the patients in pre-surgery procedures and facilities to cover the cultural gap in the food and other needy necessities of the patients. He also Highlighted problem of not having single institutional organ to govern the hospital standards.

#### **OPINION OF PANELIST**

#### PROF. DR. MURALIDHARAN, Cardiologist, Ramachandra Hospital

Prof. Dr. Muralidharan pointed out the major drawbacks in the Medical Tourism in India, where the delay in processing the visa for the medical purposes is slow and it takes around 6 months- 10 months in processing a medical visa for a knee replacement surgery. He also spoke about the perception of the Global Community for the Indian medical systems credibility. He most relevantly made his opinion on creating a separate visa processing for medical treatment. He also highlighted the ruling of the Hon'ble Madras High court on Right of the patients to get second opinion.

#### **DR. D.R.VIGNESH**

Dr. Vignesh Gandhi's he highlighted his opinion with regard to medical tourism is that India is a country with rich cultural heritage. They value doctors due to their sympathy and empathy they get from doctors in India. We can get a best kind of treatment with affordable cost. As we all know India is an exporter of all kind of medicines. So it is basically a country where people have every major and minor ailment treatment. The primary raw material APA, India is depending on China for manufacturing. APA industry is a red zone. The government is taking care of the disposal of pharmaceutical waste and the individual citizen need not worry about its disposal. He also gave an opinion on how to check the combination of the medicines, whoever manufactures the particular medicine provide a QR code to check whether the medicine is original and of correct combination.

#### **DR. SASIKUMAR MUTHU**

Dr. Sasikumar, a Plastic Surgeon, highlighted two primary branches within his field: non-surgical and surgical approaches. Discussing the impact on international patients in India, he noted that minor issues might not necessitate extensive medical visas. While medical confidentiality and tourism are integral to medical tourism in other countries, India cannot guarantee complete confidentiality due to authentication requirements for Indian visas. However, India's transparent medical procedures have their own advantages. He stressed the importance of proactive marketing, suggesting that if direct advertising isn't permitted, He advocated for necessary regulations to address these issues. He emphasized the interconnectedness of the medical profession, advocating for improved connectivity to enhance tertiary care. In the realm of cosmetic surgery, he emphasized the personal nature of the patient-doctor relationship. Dr. Sasikumar described plastic surgery as a multifaceted field with

growing interest, even though it's one of the oldest medical disciplines that continues to evolve.

#### **DR. JITHU JOSE**

Dr. Jithu Jose began his discussion by addressing the three-pronged approach of the central government based on value-based treatment. Then he went into detail about the 'Heal in India, Heal by India and Heal from India' programme of the central government. The Heal in India part of the scheme involves around inviting foreign patients for their medical treatment in India whereas the Heal by India part involves in sharing our resources with other countries and to help them with it. India trains professionals in a pan African initiative involving professionals from more than 30 African nations under this scheme and the Heal from India part deals about leverage in technologies and the second opinions provided by the Indian doctors. One of the important discussions made by Dr. Jithu is the reasons for cross border medical travel to India. 3 prime reasons were identified by the doctor. The first one being the natural inflow due to lack of infrastructure in their own countries. This is the case for the patients from countries like Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Afghanistan. The second reason is the availability of better technology in India. In countries with socialized healthcare systems like Canada, the waiting period to avail medical services is high and thus forces them to travel abroad for medical treatment. He highlighted that cross border medical travel is the highest from Indonesia to countries like Singapore and Malaysia.

#### DR. BHARGAV SIRUVELU

DR. Bhargav Siruvelu, stated the mental wellness and physical wellbeing is very important, he stated that the USA person as a patient to India in order to get the environment the patient was much in depression or the more of suicidal thoughts. He also stated that the waiting time is far lesser compared to the foreign countries. It is important to seek therapy and finding serene. He also stated that the types of medical therapy i.e., medical, therapy and alternate therapy. The foreign national can get the diverse spectrum. The medicine should be affordable, with facilities, rehabilitation, alternative treatment, and suitable environment, he also motioned India as Guru for the yoga. He was very much stressing on the wellness of the patient.

#### SUMMING UP BY MODERATOR

At the final session, Dr.Balamurali enlightened the audience about how technology plays a major role in India attracting foreign patients for treatment. He emphasized on technology to be user-friendly. He also then illustrated about the government's measure to curb the practice of foreign companies charging higher

prices in India. This measure of Indian government has made a few foreign companies to quit the Indian market as they were not able to compete at that price. However, the doctor pointed out that the government is not exactly helping the Indian companies. He concluded the session by questioning the gathering on the viability of Public-Private Partnerships (PPP) in the medical industry.


#### RECOMMENDATIONS BY THE PANEL

- ♦ To reduce the processing time of medical visa for foreign patients.
- India should have some unique treatments for our country like knee transplants in Croatia and Poland and gender change in Thailand.
- Government should create a proactive advertisement for doctors other than a list to ensure proper information is supplied to patients across the world.
- Nomenclature for insurances should include more medical and foreign terminologies.
- ♦ Government should bring some regulations and incentives to reduce the brain drain caused by migration of paramedical staff.
- ♦ Government should provide centralized translating centres to ensure that people from various countries can avail their services, without going through a middleman.
- Cuisines in the hospitals should try to be multifaceted.
- Government should from regulations to reduce the intervention of middlemen in the medical field.
- ♦ The Government should improve the availability of the resources and incentives to provide to manufacturers for vital Medical Equipment in India to bring down the cost of Medical treatments.

It complements traditional litigation by providing parties with options that are tailored to their specific needs, while also alleviating the burden on overburdened court systems. A well-functioning justice delivery system should incorporate ADR as a means to improve access to justice and promote fair and effective dispute resolution.

On 1<sup>st</sup> September 2023, Department Of Environmental Law And Legal Order conducted a special lecture on the topic "Scope and Necessity for ADR as part of Justice Delivery System". This special lecture has enhanced the importance of ADR and how an incorporation of ADR mechanism into the justice system will enhance the overall access to justice and contributes to a more efficient and equitable legal system.

## LEGAL AID CLINIC RAISES CYBER CRIME AWARENESS AT EVAANS MATRICULATION HIGHER SECONDARY SCHOOL

Chennai, October 20th, 2023.

They were also taught how to identify these crimes and the best practices to follow to ensure their own safety and well-being. They were also briefed with the intricacies of cyber law and the ways in which they could report such crimes to the relevant authorities.

The Legal Aid Clinic's mission revolves around ensuring equitable access to justice, providing free legal assistance to those in need, and creating awareness of legal matters. By taking this initiative to local schools, they are taking a significant step towards empowering the community with the knowledge and resources to tackle the growing challenge of cybercrimes.

The event aimed to explore the critical role of minority opinions in legal and environmental discourse, focusing on how dissenting voices contribute to shaping equitable and progressive policies.

The event, led by Mr. Shankar Prakash, Senior Researcher (Environment and Climate Action) at CAG, brought together eminent legal professionals, environmental advocates, and enthusiastic law students for a stimulating half-day program. The discussion revolved around landmark judgments and their minority opinions, underlining their importance in safeguarding fairness and justice.

#### **Agenda Overview**

The event commenced with an invocation and a warm welcome address by the team at SOEL, followed by a brief introduction to Climate Action Month by Team CAG. The main program included speeches from distinguished guests and an engaging Minority Opinion Justification competition, concluding with a vote of thanks.

#### **Event Proceedings**

#### 1. Invocation and Welcome Address

The day began with a ceremonial invocation by the students of SOEL, setting a solemn tone for the event. This was followed by a welcome address by a representative of SOEL, who highlighted the significance of hosting such events at academic institutions to inspire the next generation of environmental and legal professionals.

#### 2. Introduction to Climate Action Month

Team CAG presented an overview of Climate Action Month (CAM), emphasizing its mission

to drive environmental awareness and advocacy through collaborative programs. The representative reiterated CAG's commitment to fostering informed and active citizenry in tackling climate challenges.

#### 3. Speech by Dr. Justice P. Jyothimani

Dr. Justice P. Jyothimani, Former Judicial Member of the National Green Tribunal, delivered a thought-provoking keynote address. Drawing from his vast judicial experience, he elaborated on the intersection of environmental law and minority opinions. He emphasized how dissenting judgments often pave the way for groundbreaking reforms and encouraged students to critically analyze differing perspectives in legal cases.

#### 4. Speech by Advocate Vetriselvan

Advocate Vetriselvan, a prominent lawyer practicing at the High Court of Madras, addressed the audience with an engaging talk on the evolving role of minority opinions in constitutional and environmental law. He underscored the need for intellectual courage and legal acumen when challenging majority rulings, inspiring students to uphold the principles of justice and equity.

#### 5. Minority Opinion Justification Competition

The centerpiece of the event was the Minority Opinion Justification competition, where eight teams of two students each participated in the preliminary round. The participants presented arguments supporting Justice Ahmadi's dissenting opinion in the landmark case of *Union Carbide Corporation vs Union of India*. Four teams advanced to the final round, where they debated Justice Bhandari's separate opinion in the international case of *Certain Activities Carried Out by Nicaragua in the Border Area (Costa Rica v. Nicaragua)*.

The competition showcased the participants' deep understanding of legal principles and their ability to construct persuasive arguments. The audience was captivated by the clarity, conviction, and creativity demonstrated by the teams.

#### 6. Discussion and Feedback

Following the competition, a panel of judges engaged the participants in a discussion, providing constructive feedback and sharing their insights on the importance of dissent in fostering legal innovation and environmental protection.

#### 7. Vote of Thanks

The event concluded with a heartfelt vote of thanks delivered by Dr. Harita Devi, Director of

Research & Publication and Head of the Environmental Law Department at SOEL. She expressed gratitude to the distinguished speakers, participants, organizing teams, and audience for their contributions to making the event a success. Special appreciation was extended to Mr. Shankar Prakash and CAG for their dedication to promoting climate awareness.

By encouraging participants to delve into landmark cases and justify dissenting judgments, the event showcased the transformative potential of these opinions in fostering a more equitable and inclusive legal framework.

The competition served as a dynamic platform for aspiring legal professionals to immerse themselves in critical legal challenges. By debating complex cases, participants refined their abilities to research meticulously, analyze intricate legal principles, and articulate arguments convincingly. The inclusion of both national and international case law allowed students to broaden their horizons, bridging the gap between domestic and global legal perspectives. This active engagement underscored the importance of nurturing the next generation of thinkers and advocates who can lead the charge in addressing contemporary legal and environmental issues.

#### 3. Collaborative Efforts:

The partnership between the Citizen Consumer and Civic Action Group (CAG) and the School of Excellence in Law (SOEL) underscored the potential of collaborative efforts in advancing shared objectives. This synergy highlighted how academia and civil society organizations can work together to create impactful programs that blend theoretical knowledge with practical application. 

Inauguration of "E- Palkalaikazagam" an online platform of CAAF in collaboration with The Tamil Nadu Dr. Ambedkar Law University in its efforts to advance child, adolescent, and youth welfare was organized at the TNDALU, Perengudi Campus Auditorium on 5<sup>th</sup> of September 2024. The event was graced by the esteemed presence of Thiru K.V. Rajkumar, Deputy Collector and Project Director of Tamil Nadu Skill Development, and Dr. Ilankumaran Kaliamoorthy, CEO of Rela Hospitals, who delivered an inspiring speech. The presidential address was delivered by Prof. (Dr.) Gowri Ramesh, Registrar, TNDALU, followed by the official launch of the E-Platform-"E- Palkalaikazagam". This project was in part of the objectives of MOU of TNDALU with CAAF India Trust. 






#### **DEMYSTIFYING OF ELECTRICITY LAW**





ABOUT DR. JUSTICE VIMALA SABANAYAGAM



Dr. Justice S. Vimala's journey into the legal profession was driven by her deep-rooted commitment to justice and her desire to effect positive change in society. Inspired by the esteemed reputation of the legal field and supported by her parents' unwavering encouragement, she embarked on a path of academic excellence. Starting with a degree in Chemistry from Seethalakshmi Ramaswamy College in Tiruchy, Dr. Vimala pursued her passion for law by obtaining a bachelor's degree from the renowned Madras Law College. Her academic journey continued with a Master's degree in Crime and Torts from Pondicherry Law College, culminating in a ground-breaking Ph.D. from the Tamil Nadu Dr. Ambedkar Law University, making her the first sitting judge of the Madras High Court to achieve this distinction. Commencing her legal career in 1983 as an advocate, Dr. Vimala quickly made her mark in the legal arena, practicing extensively in Chidambaram and Cuddalore district courts. Her dedication and expertise led to her appointment as a District Judge in 1999, marking the beginning of a series of significant milestones. In 2002, Dr. Vimala shattered barriers by becoming the first woman judge of the Chennai Mahila Court, setting a precedent for gender equality in the judiciary. Her pioneering spirit continued as she assumed the role of the first woman Director of the Tamil Nadu State Judicial Academy in 2006, where she advocated for the rights of marginalized individuals, particularly inmates of government homes. Elevated to the esteemed position of Registrar General of the Madras High Court in 2010, Dr. Vimala's exemplary leadership and unwavering dedication to justice were further recognized. Subsequently appointed as an additional judge in 2011 and later as a permanent judge in 2013, she continued to uphold principles of fairness and equity in her judicial decisions. Dr. Vimala's contributions extended beyond the courtroom, showcasing her versatility as a writer with the publication of her insightful book, "Whether winning a case means success in life." This work, lauded by the Tamil Nadu State Commission for Women, exemplifies her commitment to addressing broader societal issues through legal discourse. Even in retirement, Dr. Vimala's commitment to justice remains resolute. As a member of the Tamil Nadu State Law Commission, she continues to advocate for the accessibility and affordability of justice for all citizens, ensuring that her legacy of service endures for generations to come.

Director, Kasturi & Sons Ltd., Former Editor, The Hindu and former Chairperson, The Hindu Group



# ABOUT MS. MALINI PARTHASARATHY

Malini Parthasarathy is Director, Kasturi & Sons Ltd, owners of The Hindu Group of Publications. She was the Chairperson of The Hindu Group Publishing from July 2020 to June 2023. She was earlier the Editor of The Hindu newspaper, the Group's influential flagship publication between 2013

and 2016. Prior to that, she was Executive Editor of the paper from 1996 to 2004. During her tenure as Editor, the Mumbai edition of The Hindu was launched on November 28, 2015, a major landmark in the 143 year-history of the newspaper as the paper made a striking entry into India's financial capital, a century and more after its launch in 1878. With the launch of the edition in Mumbai, The Hindu was able to establish a nationwide presence, with an edition already existing in New Delhi, the national capital. The Hindu also registered a 20 percent increase in readership nationally, at this time. Dr Parthasarathy has been a political journalist for three decades and more, writing news stories and editorials on major themes in Indian politics, particularly on the rise of Hindu nationalism and the consequent challenges to the prevailing consensus of governance based on civic nationalism and secularism. She founded the Hindu Centre for Politics and Public Policy, a think-tank intended as a credible and independent platform for an exploration of ideas and public policies with the aim of rebuilding public faith in India's democratic process. At the time of the Centre's launch in January 2013, public confidence in India's democratic institutions and political processes was at an all-time low. She was the Director of the Centre at its inception. Dr Parthasarathy is deeply interested in themes relating to the preservation of the civic and secular character of India's nationhood especially as she believes it is a critical prerequisite for the survival of India as a democracy and as a nation. She has pursued this theme actively in her journalistic writings. Highlights of her journey as a reporter and editor include a series of interviews with Indian Prime Ministers, V.P Singh, Rajiv Gandhi, P.V Narasimha Rao and I.K Gujral. She was the first ever Indian journalist to interview former Pakistan President Pervez Musharraf in January 2000 at a highly inflamed moment in India-Pakistan ties, taking place shortly after the hijacking of an Indian passenger aircraft to Kandahar, Afghanistan. She had a second interview with Musharraf in 2002. She also did interviews of other top Pakistani leaders such as Benazir Bhutto and Nawaz Sharif and leading political figures in Sri Lanka such as the former President, Chandrika Kumaratunga. She was the first Indian journalist to interview Condoleezza Rice, then the US National Security Advisor in the Bush administration and also was the first to interview Strobe Talbott, Deputy Secretary of State in the

Clinton administration, immediately after India's nuclear test and the subsequent US sanctions. She has an M.S in journalism from Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism, graduating in 1982. After graduation from the Columbia Journalism School, she was briefly a Visiting Journalist at the Washington Post before joining The Hindu in 1983. She received a PhD from the Centre for Political Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University in 2008. Her doctoral thesis on 'Majoritarianism and Indian Nationhood' was an exploration of Hindu cultural nationalism through the decades and its strong challenge to the construction of India's national identity as civic and secular in orientation, based on citizenship rather than community. As Chairperson of The Hindu Group of publications, she actively steered a journey of digital transformation of the editorial products, particularly The Hindu which now has a strong digital presence with an increasing subscriber base not limited to India. Her emphasis was on ensuring that the publishing group established a leading presence in new media territory without losing focus on the core business of printing and the imperative of maintaining the credibility and integrity of its journalistic offerings.

# About Dr. Swarnamalaya Ganesh

Dr. Swarnamalya is a combination of a performer with over 35 years of experience, a scholar of dance history as well as a trained academician in Performance Studies and Sociology. Her Ph.D dissertation was on "Research and Reconstruction of lost dance repertories of Early Modern South India (Nayak Period)". In a pioneering effort she studied in-depth the history and sources involved in the lost performing traditions to reconstruct them. "From The Attic" is a performance- lecture- exhibition series based on her research. From collaborations with artistes of various genres to reflecting the multi cultural historicity of dance and music in South India, FTA stands as a unique voice that reveals the cultural networks of the Tamil, Persianate and Sanskritic worlds to actively speak of the arts, as a negotiator for peace, harmony and inter-faith dialogue in today's world. Jakkini, Sivalila, Gondhali, Perani are some of her pioneering reconstructed repertoires, widely appreciated. Her latest work is RAKTI - Collaborations In Pleasure, was created as a multisensorial Music-Dance-Live Works engaging with pleasure as a social disposition of Early Modern Deccan and therefore an instrument of peace, bringing international musicians from Iran and Egypt to meet Indian music on the multicultural platform of performance. This was premiered to a Full House in 2023 at The Serendipity Arts Festival, Goa. The first Bharatanatyam (Sadir) dancer of South India, to go to Pakistan, her latest performance Sadir-Beyond Borders, initiated a much needed conversation on cross border empathy, togetherness in crisis, hope and peace as resistance to hate and partisan politics. Her recent performances at the Kochi Biennale, the UK under the auspices of Akademi, European Tour to Prague, Vienna and Germany as well as the most recent Australian Arts Council tour to perform at Asia Topa brought excellent visibility to From the Attic and Sadir. During the pandemic, she continued to offer tutorials and lectures for student communities and worked with folk artiste families on Covid Relief. Swarnamalya was one among the six chosen Indian artistes on whom a movie was produced by Arts Quotient and India Foundation for the Arts called #BehindTheSeen Her further research interests include Sadir as the subaltern form of Bharatanatyam through gender, culture, society, stigma and political movements. Her first book was titled Nammai Marandarai Naam

Marakkamattom (Tamil) based on her very successful stage production of the same title, the Tamil Epic Silappadikaram from the POV of Madhavi, the danseuse. She researched to bring to light the history of repertoires in early 20th century Madras, under her production Dancing in the Parlour. Her more recent production Choreographing Society- a tryst with destiny raises critical questions around inherent inequalities; identities, stigma and the legal frame striving to relieve democracy from it. As a writer and thinker, some of her eminent contributions to critical theories on performance history call for interrogation of post colonial scholarship through her on-going project "Decolonising Dance History" where she develops new and experimental methods of writing performance histories; Decolonising Dance History Project, Notions of Classical in Bharatanatyam, Sex and Gender in Performance, Mired in Dravidian Politics, Womanity, Daughters of Pandanallur - the other story. In her professorial capacity she has designed and taught courses such as Past Performing Practices, Art as History, Women in Performance, Literature and Media that cover archival writing practices and performance in the study of the body and culture as a lived experience. Her more recent addition has been a workshop style course on ditties and dances of folk and tribal cultures from across the world titled "Or Muf Leh" She is also a sought after speaker on topics pertaining to Education, Art and culture. As a Fulbright-Nehru Fellow for Academic and Professional Excellence, Swarnamalya went to UCLA to teach and pursue post doctoral research. She is trained in Indian and Middle Eastern music, epigraphy, history and archeology. She has received prestigious awards and fellowships for her contributions. An invited member on the Ministry of Culture advisory board for the Telangana Government, she is currently co-ordinator for the Global Arts Program and a Professor of Practice (Literature & The Arts), KREA University, India. She is also the Director of Ranga Mandira Academy of World Dance/ Performance and Indic Studies which works at providing education in Performing Arts. Ranga Mandira runs a community radio for the arts and also creates a platform for sustainable development for the hereditary artiste communities. She has served as a visiting faculty at SASTRA University, Madras University, and a guest faculty to Ashoka University, Bridgewater State University (Boston), and Flame University in India.

#### DAY-1 HALL 1- AUDITORIUM, PERUNGUDI CAMPUS

In Hall 1, the auditorium at the Perungudi Campus, the Parallel Session 1 [12:00- 1:00 PM] was chaired by Prof. Dr. T. Balasaravanan, Associate Professor and Head of the Department of Economics at SIVET College, and Dr. Paramsivam from TNDALU. The session centered on the theme "Growth & Development of Blue Economy: Ocean Fisheries Management – Challenges & Issues." Twelve papers were presented, discussing sustainable fishing practices, conservation of marine resources, regulatory frameworks, and community participation in fisheries management. The session provided a platform for researchers and practitioners to exchange ideas on sustainable ocean resource management, contributing to the conference's objective of promoting harmonious economic transformation and environmental sustainability.




# **VALEDICTORY CEREMONY**





# DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL LAW AND LEGAL ORDER "ONE-DAY FIELD TRIP TO ENNORE"

Ennore, also spelt Ennūr, is a neighbourhood in Chennai, India. Ennore is situated on a peninsula and is bounded by the Korttalaiyar River, Ennore Creek and the Bay of Bengal. The creek separates south Ennore from the north Ennore which covers major portions of North Chennai Thermal Power Station and Ennore Port. The neighbourhood is served by Ennore railway station. Over the years Ennore has become the hub of a range of industrial projects, mainly thermal power stations, fertilizer factories, industrial ports and coal yards. Ennore Creek is a backwater located in Tiruyallur district, Tamil Nadu. The Ennore Creek is bound on the north by the Pulicat Lake and to the south by the Manali marshlands. The Arani River enters the creek's northern edge below Lake Pulicat. To the south, Kosasthalaiyar River and the surplus course of the Puzhal Lake enter the creek. The estuary at Mugatwarakuppam drains all of these waters into the Bay of Bengal. Six revenue villages, namely Kathivakkam, Ennore, Puzhudhivakkam, Athipattu, Pudunagar, Kattupalli and Kalanji are located around the Creek. Despite being protected under such regulations, the unplanned industrial development of this area over the last few decades have had devastating effects on the whole ecosystem, resulting in loss of ecology and livelihoods of the fishing communities. The creek is encroached by industries in several locations, which led to a reduction of the water covered area.

On 28.02.2024 Post post-graduation students from the Department of Environmental Law and legal order went to a FIELD TRIP AT ENNORE AND ITS SURROUNDINGS conducted by the Non-governmental organisation, The Chennai Climate Action Group. The field trip was attended by the Post graduation students, NGOs and were given an opportunity to express their view on current scenario of Ennore. Though this Field trip aims to explore the unexplored and unnoticed side of Chennai which is getting bad environmental degradation day by day.





#### **NALLATHANNI ODAI KUPPAM:**

The first place we visited was Nallathanniodai kuppam. Standing on a sand embankment at the shore of Nallathanni Odai Kuppam in north Chennai, the eyes watched the massive metal cranes of the Chennai Port, visible at the skyline. Nine months in a year, ocean tides move from the south to north. They carry silt and sand from the ocean floor with them. The Chennai Port is built in a way that restricts this movement by acting like a barrier. With nowhere to go, the sand gets accumulated at the Marina beach. Thus we can observe that Marina is An Artificial beach.



#### MANALI NEW TOWN:

Then the trip continues to Manali new town. It is a wetland area and during the rainy season some oil leakage also occurs. This is situated in the Bed of Kosasthalai river and also the Buckingham canal passing through this manali new town.







#### BURMA NAGAR:

Then the next place was Burma Nagar. Many urbanisation activities take place here. There are total 6877 houses were built by Tamil Nadu Urban Habitat Development Board.





#### **VNC BRIDGE:**

The next place is the VNC bridge which flies above the Kosasthalai River. From this bridge, we can able to see the Ennore Power plant and also we can able to observe the Quality of water visibly. This place ius near to Ennore Creek so that all the industrial oil effulients which mixed to the river will be settled in the banks of Kosasthaliar river. This place is Identidied as the Eco Sensitive Area. We can able to observe the Mangrove forest. And a Cooling Tower of the plant which is under testing also situated near this Bridge. Even the Fly Ashes also settled in the water can be seen.








#### **CHEPAKKAM VILLAGE:**

Chepakkam village is the next place we visited. In this village we are able to witness the Pipelines which transport the Coal Ashes. Those pipelines extend upto nearly 25 kms which took Ash and water which was laid by North Chennai Thermal Power Station. Many times there is a leakage on it and court proceedings are under process. There is a worst maintenance of these pipelines are observed. Until 2017, this area was Classified as 'Special and Hazardous Zone' where no residences could be built.








#### **KATTUPALLI VILLAGE:**

Kattupalli village is the final place of this field visit. Here we observed the extension of the Adani Kattupalli Port Pvt. Ltd. The whole area was desertified by the company and the native villagers lost their habitat. Both the Government and private sectors made major environmental degradation. There are nearly 80 fishing community villages in and around the seashore. The proposed mega port at Kattupalli wants to convert the Ennore Pulicat backwaters into an industrial area. It would also hit a major source of drinking water in a place which has been reeling under water crisis over the last few years. The megaport would replace the Minjur Desalination Plant located at Kattupalli. Chennai gets a fourth of its daily water supply from the plant and Kosasthalaiyar-Araniyar basin. Although the plant will be moved to another site, this disturbance in water supply will result in further water scarcity in the city.

#### ABOUT THANJAVUR VEENA AND GI PROTECTION



#### THANJAVUR VEENA

The Thanjavur veena is one of the most ancient and revered South Indian instruments. The Thanjavur veena has an interesting construction. They are of two types viz. The "Ekantha Veena" and "Sada Veena". "Ekantha Veena" is carved from a single block of wood, while "Sada Veena" has joints and is carved in three sections. The veena has 24 fixed frets (Mettu), so that all ragas can be played. Thanjavur veena has seven strings, four are playing strings and three are drone strings (thalam). It has no sympathetic strings. In Thanjavur Veena, the main bridge is a flat bar made of brass. This bar has a very slight curve. It is this light curve which gives the veena its characteristic sound. The body of the Veena is beautifully painted, carved and chiselled by hand. It is this which makes the Thanjavur Veena distinct and elegant from other Veenas. Other Features: 52" Long, 24 brass frets, 7 strings, Painted and carved peg box, with wooden shell case.

The Thanjavur Veena is about four feet in length. It has a large, round body with a thick, wide neck, the end of which is carved into the head of a dragon. A small resonator is attached to the underside of the neck. Thanjavur veena has 24 fixed frets (Mettu), so that all ragas could be played. These 24 metal frets are embedded with hardened bees-wax, mixed with charcoal powder. Thanjavur veena has seven strings, four are playing strings and three are drone strings (Thalam). It has no sympathetic strings. Melody is produced on four metal strings that run above the frets. These are stretched over a wide bridge that sits on the body of the veena. Three other strings run alongside the neck of the instrument. These are used for maintaining time and for playing the drone.

Thus, the Thanjavur veena has an interesting construction. The performer, sits 179 cross-legged on the stage, rests the small resonator on the left lap. The fingers of the left hand are used to press, pull and glide on the frets, while the fingers of the right hand are used to pluck and twang the strings.

#### **PURPOSE OF VISIT**

The Students of LL.M. (Intellectual Property Law Department – Batch of 2023 to 2024), The Tamil Nadu Dr. Ambedkar Law University, visited Thanjavur on 22nd March, 2024 to conduct an empirical study regarding the GI of the Thanjavur veena. The purpose of visit is to study the impact of the GI registration for Thanjavur veena and create awareness among the about the same. And to see whether the benefits of the GI registration also benefit the producer. The Thanjavur veena has been conferred GI for its above-mentioned unique characteristics and has been granted with the Part A registration from the IP office, Chennai. Part B registration is for the registration of the authorized users for the specified GI product. Therefore, the purpose of the visit by the students mainly focuses on creating awareness among the producers who are the manufacturers of Thanjavur veena and also among the law students.

#### **THE PROCESS OF CARVING:**

The body of the Thanjavur Veenai is painted and engraved with delicate wood work which usually consists of picture of God and goddess, motifs of flowers or birds, give it an elegant beauty of appearance. The process of carving the Thanjavur veena is pain staking, delicate, time consuming and involves superior craftsmanship. As mentioned supra the Thanjavur veena has an interesting construction. There are two types of Thanjavur Veena, they are "Ekantha Veena" and "Sada Veena". "Ekantha Veena" is carved from a single block of wood, while "Sada Veena" has joints and it is carved in three sections (i) resonator, (ii) neck and (iii) head.

#### THE RAW MATERILA USED:

The wood obtained from the Jack wood tree is mainly used in making of Thanjavur Veena. However, occasionally Rosewood and Champak wood is also used. Wood from the fully grown Jack wood tree without nodes is usually chosen for making Thanjavur Veena. The Jack wood trees

found in and around Thanjavur is of fine and superior quality. Prior to usage the wood should be seasoned for a minimum period six months.

The handiwork on the Thanjavur Veena is unique to the artisans of Thanjavur. The Thanjavur Veena was the first modified Veena with 24 fixed frets that evolved in Thanjavur during the time of Ragunatha Nayak. Consequently, by fixing the frets the same Veena could be used to play all the Ragas in one Veena. The fixing of the frets (twelve for each octave) paved the 180 ways for the development of the famous scheme of seventy-two mela kartas of the Karnataka system. The style of presenting Carnatic music has grown largely around the Thanjavur Veena technique and many of the noted south Indian musicians, musicologists and composers of the past have been Thanjavur Veena players. The variety of wood used from a particular strain of matured Jack wood tree is unique to Thanjavur, hence the Veena made from the said Jack wood tree is unique.

#### **OBSERVATION: THE ISSUES FACED BY THE PRODUCERS:**

So the material got by them are ready and the speciality of the veena is it is made out of jack wood due to the light weight capacity and the raw materials are got from panruti and it colour changes eventually in future though the GI protection is given to them yet there are many difficulties faced by them they do not have proper infrastructure to carry out the production though there is more of economic growth compared to before protection and after protection and the export facilities have been increased they also have their own website for the purpose of export but the manufacturing this veena need skill and experience and only few are involved in the making of the veena and this art work and handicraft might die in the coming future due to lack of people experienced in this

many are not coming up to learn this art so the is soon an extinct for this so government may take up the fund for the students to learn this art work and also can form a hub to make people aware of this and can also bring up courses like poly technology so that students can take up the course and learn the art work and these people who are involved in the making have very less infrastructure so government can give them loan and also help them by giving place and free them from rental issues the only thing that they have advantage is they are free from GST due to the handmade art. And the artistic work in that veena is also handmade by GI protection is for overall veena the artistic work is not separately recognised and sometimes the deer horn is also used to made the craftwork and it takes up to 25 days to make one veena as per the survey the only concern is that they have no one in the next generation to carry out this art so government funding and initiative to start a course to learn the art will be very useful.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

The opportunity provided to the students by TNDALU has served its purpose as the producers have gained the initial awareness about the GI to promote the goods which they are producing in this manner the outreach program has been successful among the weavers and the students. The producers were made aware of the concept of GI and the Part A registration for the Thanjavur veena. They were also provided with complete information about the Part B registration. This enables them to benefit from the use of the GI tag on their products when placed for sale. This will encourage traditional family will also not stop their handicraft if they get their correct benefits for the production of the Thanjavur veena.



#### **ABOUT THANJAVUR ART PLATE & GI PROTECTION**



The Thanjavur Art Plates, also known as Tanjore art plates, was granted Geographical Indication (GI) tag on 26<sup>th</sup> July 2007 and this artistic masterpiece gained popularity. The application was filed by Development Commissioner (Handicrafts), Ministry of Textiles, Government of India, from the data being collected from the Handicrafts Marketing & Service Extension Centre (Pondicherry) of the Office of DC (Handicrafts) from the crafts clusters of Thanjavur District for the registration of "THANJAVUR ART PLATE" in Part A of the Register under Application No. 63 in respect of Handicrafts falling under Class 14.

The Thanjavur Art Plates are crafted using a combination of intricate designs, skilled metalwork, and often embellished with religious motifs, making them popular as both decorative pieces and religious artifacts. Thanjavur town for over several decades accounts for the finest examples of embossed works in India. The art plate is an exquisite product of the artisans of Thanjavur. For the sheer beauty of its purpose and vigour of its style, it occupies a pride of place among the show pieces adorning elegantly furnished houses. The art of engraving and embossing beautiful figures and images of different size and shapes on metal, mainly silver and fixing them on brass or copper plates is the unique merit of the craft.

The geographical area of production for Thanjavur art plates primarily centres around Thanjavur and its surrounding regions within Tamil Nadu. This craft has been practiced for centuries in this region and holds significant cultural and artistic importance.

The process of creating Thanjavur art plates involves intricate craftsmanship and skilled techniques passed down through generations. Artisans typically start with a brass or copper base, which serves as the foundation for the artwork. They then meticulously etch or engrave designs onto the metal surface using specialized tools.

#### PURPOSE OF VISIT

The Students of LL.M. (Intellectual Property Law Department – Batch of 2022-2024), The Tamil Nadu Dr. Ambedkar Law University, visited Thanjavur on 22<sup>nd</sup> March, 2024 to conduct an empirical study with regard to one of the GI of Thanjavur which is the Thanjavur Art Plates. The purpose of the visit is to study the impact of the GI registration for the Thanjavur Art Plates and create awareness among the people about the same. The Thanjavur art plates have been conferred GI tag for its above-mentioned uniqueness involved in the craftsmanship. These art plates form a part of Gifts articles, wall clocks and mementoes in the market nowadays. The Thanjavur Art plates have been granted with Part A registration from the IP office, Chennai. The purpose of the visit was mainly to create the awareness about the uniqueness and significance of this handicraft among the law students.

#### **METHOD OF PRODUCTION**

The Thanjavur art works use three metals (brass-metal base, copper, silver) ornamentation with embossing techniques to craft the art plates. Generally, the Art Plates are round or oval in shape and the base plate in brass from the size of 3" to 48" with the side decoration figures are embossed in silver and copper foils generally in the gauge of 44.



The encrusted work of Thanjavur Art Plate is very famous from traditional times. The ornamentation mostly consists of figure of Puranic Gods and logos. These figure ornaments are either neaten out from the metal surface of the article itself, a kind of repousse, or they are separately made and skill-fully soldered or riveted onto the metal article. They use an array of various hammers and tools to derive the impression on the plates. The silver and metal plates are placed onto a mould and hammered strongly until the impression of the mould in imprinted onto the plates. A lot of hard work and skillfulness is involved in the same.





The style and range of the craft includes Thanjavur Art plates, bowls, napkin rings, powder boxes etc., made of copper and brass with motifs drawn from Hindu mythology and encrusted in Silver against, a finely engraved background depicting the superlative skill and mastery of material. There is a vast product diversification. Like wall clocks, mementoes, wall hangings etc. Mementoes were also done and supplying in any desired shape and quantity with the given inscriptions.



#### **MARKETING:**

The study was conducted with the limited objective of identifying problems areas in the matter of production and marketing was carried out. A brief Questionaries seeking information as to the year of commencement of production, nativity of the craftsmen, types of art work produced, sources of finance comprising owned and borrowed funds, number of workers, particulars regarding production design, size of the art plates, distribution channels, etc., was prepared.

Marketing starts and ends with the consumer; the consumer preference satisfactions are to be ascertained. The art metals work is mostly decorative used by rich people although several designs are produced in different sizes of plates, only certain designs are preferred by customers and plates of different sizes. The plates ranging from 8 to 12 inches are moving fast for the simple reason that they suit the budgets of middle-class people and are also convenient to handle.

In general pattern of the marketing of art plates is that independent artisans working in their homes, or workshop owners sell the goods manufactured by them either to big stockists or small shop keeper, directly or through specifics intermediate agencies. The big dealers have relatively high financial resources and some of them have goods made to order directly from the artisans, advancing money to them for the purchase of materials.

artisans working on this basis were generally in regular debt to dealers from these advances. With a more liberalised credit policy being followed by banks in India and the current emphasis on easy credit facilities being extended to the weaker sections of society the situations of indebtedness amongst craftsmen have improved only a little extent.

The role of private enterprise in the field of art plate marketing has been, and is today, overwhelmingly important. About 60 percent of art plate production is handled by private agencies and the rest by public marketing and co-operative agencies. The individual craftsman who makes art plates do not follow any scientific method of pricing of their products, The customers who visits their workshops have to bargain before concluding the sale.

The craftsmen are generally poor and cannot afford to maintain stocks of high value till they get remunerative prices. Since the cost of production varies from time to time for each item, there is no guaranteed for fixed price.

This trade did not attract middlemen or agents on a large scale as in other business. Middlemen are not engaged in this trade all the time. They are usually jewellery merchants and business are only secondary. The craftsmen are unable to secure a distant market directly either in north India or

export market overseas. It is learnt that a few wealthy merchants of north India who found the exportability of such plates, entered into the business of exporting art plates to foreign countries.

It has regular and bulk importing customers in countries like the USA, France, Italy. The demand from the local market for this product is very limited. Foreign tourists who visits Thanjavur buy such plates at poompuhar.. not all individual craftsmen but few maintain contacts with handicrafts emporia in other states. Recently, the demand for art plates has been slowly picking up due to the overall publicity given by the handicraft development corporation. Individual and corporation undertakings also place special bulk orders for art plates and other art works like keychains, emblem plates etc to be used as complimentary articles on jubilee occasions. Such customers give orders

For special plates to be made with their company emblem in the centre of the plate. The state bank of India, rallies India, etc are some of the institutions who gave such bulk orders. Speaking of credit facilities craftsmen need easy credit to free themselves from money lenders. Only few of them could get loan from state institution others lend money for their business from local money lenders. Interestingly, reserve bank of India has issued guidelines to all commercial banks for an artisan to receive bank credit up to Rs.25000 for equipment finance. The rate of interest is 91/2% per annum in specified backward districts and 11% in other areas, excluding the cases which would be covered by the differential rate of interest scheme.

#### **SUGGESTIONS:**

The craft is one of our ancient decorative arts and is worth preserving for its artistic merit alone. To preserve the craft and develop it further, the following course of action is suggested:

- 1. Most of the artisans confine themselves to the traditional designs which consist of mythological figures; they are generally conservative and do not attempt new designs because a fresh os-plate has to be made for every new design and it involves considerable amount of work. To capture the market, the artisan should come forward to study and know the tastes of consumers. They have to adopt new designs.
- 2. Raw materials are mostly procured locally by the artisans. The price level of local market is not steady. Particularly the price of silver is causing hardship to one and all. It forms a major component in the cost of production of this craft. Hence arrangements can be, made for the supply of such materials through the art plate workers co-operative cottage industries society or the district industries centre at Thanjavur.

- 3. Only 60 percent of the craftsmen are getting finance from the organised money market, particularly from the nationalised commercial banks. Others get it from local money-lenders like chettyar, Saits etc., at exorbitant interest rates. The latter category includes most of the craftsmen who do not have adequate business outside the states they deserve more attention from the nationalised commercial banks or co-operative banks, at least under the new20point programme.
- 4. The craftsmen should conform to the standard gauge of materials particularly in brass, copper and silver to ensure durability of the craft. Some of them resort to the reduction of the silver content of the craft so as to quote lesser prices than others. This is done by reducing the size of either the main motif or the primary reliefs. Such practices tend to diminish the majestic look of the craft. Hence, it is suggested that the artisans should try to standardise their works so as to maintain the traditional image of the craft.
- 5. The Tamil university too can contribute to the task of popularising art plate works by arranging for a box-display containing all varieties of Thanjavur art plate works, both traditional and modern adaptations, in its museum within the university complex.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

The opportunity provided to the students by TNDALU has served its purpose as the artisans have gained the initial awareness about the GI to promote the goods which they are producing in this manner the outreach program has been successful among the artisans and the students. The artisans were made aware of the concept of GI and the Part A registration for the Thanjavur art plates. They were also provided with complete information about the Part B registration and the three artisans have consented to it with complete knowledge. This enables them to benefit from the use of the GI tag on their products when placed for sale. This will encourage more weavers to cultivate the GI product in the region and obtain Part B registration. The Traditional family will also not stop making plates if they get their correct benefits for the production of the Thanjavur Art plates.



#### ABOUT THANJAVUR NETTI WORKS AND GI PROTECTION



#### **SPECIFICATION**

Thanjavur Netti Works (Thanjavur Pith Work) is made from pith. The pith is obtained from Netti, a hydrophyte plant called as Aeschynomene Aspera. The artisans are skilled in this particular craft and this art is traditionally and hereditarily transferred from their fore-fathers. The notable works from Thanjavur Netti Works include models of the Brihadeeshwara Temple, Hindu Idols, Garlands, door hangings and show pieces used for decoration. The Pith stems, i.e. hydrophytes are found in and around the Thanjavur region and Mannargudi. The lakes around Pudukottai (Pudukullam & Kallaperumbur lake) are surrounded with marshy land which favours the growth of the Hydrophytic plant. The soil found in Thanjavur is favourable for the growth of the plant that is used for the production of pith handicraft based in Thanjavur.

Thanjavur Netti works in the Thanjavur district (formerly known as Tanjore) is one of the primary traditional art forms that have been famous all over the world. Thanjavur and Kumbakonam (including areas in and around) are two towns in this district that have prolific artisans and craftsmen who excel in this craft of making artifacts out of pit obtained from Hydrophyte family Aeschynomene Aspera.

Netti / Sholapith is a variety of weed of hydrophyte plant which is used as raw materials for developing the artifacts. It is a dried milky white spongy plant material. It is also known as "kidachi" in Malayalam and "Pent" in Telugu. The biological name of Netti/ Sholapith is 'Aeschynomene indica' or 'Aeschynomene aspera'. The 'netti' is the cortex or core of the plant and is about 1 ½ inch in diameter.

Aeschynomene Aspera is an aquatic plant which is considered as a minor weed of rice paddies. The

food stored in the stem of this plant forms the Pith. Pith cells lie at the center of the stem for the

storage of the food. Pith forms the core of the plant that grows in water. The leaf of the hydrophytic

plant looks like the leaf of Indian Gooseberry. The flower is yellow in colour. They grow on the

margins of wetlands, such as lagoons, tanks and lakes as well as in swampy grassland. It also

grows on the river beds in Thanjavur. It is also known as kidachi, Pent, Netti, etc. with the

biological name of 'Aeschynomene indica' or 'Aeschynomene asperar. These hydrophytes may also

be obtained from small lakes and ponds in the region of Thanjavur.

Good quality pith is pure white in colour with soft surface and no cracks, while poor quality pith is

one with reddish core and a hard bark and has many nodes. They are very light and careful

handling is required. The pith is a very delicate material and highly brittle in nature.

The distinctness of the Pith artifact's remains in the simplicity of its production. The artifact's

created out of the pith obtained from the hydrophytic plants looks similar to the ones made in

marble and to the ones made in elephant's tusk. They shine in a very elegant way. However,

products made from the Pith are brittle and break easily, unless kept carefully. Hence, most models

are preserved inside a glass box.

The Thanjavur Netti Works production is based in the Thanjavur District (majority of production is

done in the towns of Thanjavur, Kumbakonam and Pudukkottai) Pudukkottai District in Tamilnadu

#### PROOF OF ORIGIN (HISTORICAL RECORDS)

Like many other traditional crafts, Thanjavur Netti works had its origin in the ritual and religious needs of the people. The pith was initially used for making garlands out of slices beautifully cut into cylindrical and round shapes and then dyed with different colours. Bulls and buffaloes were garlanded during 'Mattu Pongal', which is celebrated during January or February i.e. during harvesting season. Mattu Pongal is celebrated very lavishly in the Tanjore region which was one of the encouraging factors for progress of pith handicrafts. In addition to this the Netti work is said to have been existed from the Maratha period as stated in the Tanjore Gazette. Documented records about Tanjore (as it was then called) gives out 'pith' as an important industry for making of pith images and garlands, which was carried on by 'Nayudus', 'Marathas' and 'Musalmams' of that region. Record states that business flourished during that time. The pith was obtained from near Tanjore or Mannargudi. They were cut with long sharp knives into wafers which were curled and pinned into the shapes of beautiful white flowers or figures and decorated with glided metal. Customer base was very wide i.e. customers were from all over the Madras presidency (as it was then called). The rich heritage and historically significant spots in Tanjore has also been a motivating factor for such rare and precious art forms to flourish. Further, Gazetteer records of 1907 also states that, Pith work as an important industry and its product was known to be used in 'Mattu Pongal' festival. Hence origins of pith works is an age-old tradition.

#### **METHOD OF PRODUCTION**

Netti (Pith) is the basis of any of the materials crafted in Thanjavur. It is obtained from the lakes across Thanjavur, Pudukottai and Mannargudi. Netti is a special variety of pith (waterside weed), used as raw material for developing the pith models. It is a milky-white, light weight sponge-wood which is grown in marshy waterlogged areas. The biological name of shola pith is Aeschynomene aspera.

Indica or Aeschynomene Aspera (bean family) and is an herbaceous plant. Only good quality pith that is pure white in colour with soft surface and no cracks are used for production, while poor quality pith with the reddish core and a hard bark (has many nodes) is discarded. The pith is very light and careful handling is required. The pith is a very delicate material and highly brittle in nature. The root is boiled, and dried in the sun. It is then cut to size and a pencil drawing is

inscribed on it. A rough carving is followed by the carving of finer details with a blunt chisel and it is polished with sandpaper finally.

The outer brown skin is removed by cutting with the help of a sharp knife. The inner soft white portion of the stem is used to make the art pieces. The pith locally known as Netti is cut into fine pieces of different designs and shapes as per the requirement of the product to be made. For basic carving long knife is used and for detail and minute carving small knife is used. The carved pieces are assembled together and stuck with adhesive into one piece of art. blue prints of the design or photos are used as reference to make the miniatures. It takes one day to make small figures whereas 10 to 12 days to finish a detailed designed idol. It takes almost a month to finish set of art piece of a place or temple.



Sometimes customers send the reference of the art piece they want to be made. Some pith works are painted with water colors to make it look colourful and attractive. Thanjavur Netti Works is famous for miniature works of Thanjavur temples and idol making. The finished pith work is generally fixed to a wooden base and covered with glass to protect from dust and moisture. This helps to preserve the works for years. For normal pieces ply wood made stands are used as base, whereas for big and important pieces teak and wood stands are used. Miniatures of rural and urban place are also made, which are decorated with lights. The art pieces made of pith starts at the range of fifty rupees and goes up to lakh.

#### **RAW MATERIALS**

Netti / Sholapith is a variety of weed of hydrophyte plant which is used as raw materials for developing the artifacts. It is a dried milky white spongy plant material. It is also known as "kidachi" in Malayalam and "Pent" in Telugu. The biological name of Netti/ Sholapith is 'Aeschynomene indica' or 'Aeschynomene aspera'. The 'netti' is the cortex or core of the plant and is about 1½ inch in diameter. They are very light and expert handling is required. The core is light, porous. Soft, and pliable and can be shaped to suit the imagination of the artisan. Good quality pith is pure white and smooth with soft bark and no nodes, wherein poor-quality weed is one in which pith is reddish in colour with hard bark and has many nodes.

There are certain small lakes. Ponds in the region of Thanjavur from wherein hydrophytes maybe obtained.

#### **TOOLS**

Tools used are simple and doesn't involve any chemicals or environment harming substance. They are stated as follows:

- Sola Pith Plant (Netti): Used to make the miniature art piece.
- Long Knife (Kathi): Used to carve the pith into required shape and size.
- Small Knife: Used to carve the minute details of the design.
- Carborundum Stone (sana kal): Used to sharpen the knife.

Other tools that are used for this handicraft are mentioned below:

- Scissors for sculpting the precise detailing and various combinations.
- Geometry box for precise measurement and details.
- Glass case (it is used to cover the pith artifact).
- Glass cutter (It is a tool used to make a shallow score in one surface of a piece of glass that is to be broken in two pieces).

- Silicon carbide combination stone is used for sharpening knives, chisels. plane iron. blades, etc. and
- Home-made glue/ paste.

#### PROCESS OF MANUFACTURING

Steps followed in production is illustrated as follows:

- i. The pith plant is recognized by the shallow layer of leaves that float on the marshy water at a depth of two to six feet. The pith which is grown on the water will grow up to 4-5 feet. It will become dry when the water becomes dry.
- ii. The pith collector collects this reed. The reed is dried and subsequently sold as sticks of 2 to 3 feet.
- iii. The brown cover of the Hydrophyte (Sholapith) is sliced and removed using an appropriate knife.
- iv. Only ivory coloured pith is selected and processed further. If pith is of colour which is not of standard quality it is discarded.
- v. Thereafter using knife as an only tool, pith is sliced into equal dimensions. It is done in such detailing that every slice is of equal dimensions so that there is no disparity when Artifacts is being compiled.
- vi. They are cut, sliced and sub structured in accordance with the specification of the product. (Illustration: in structure of 'Nandi the bull' broad outlines of Nandi is designed on the pith rows and thereafter sliced into equal dimensions creating a number of Nandi structure; Similar preparation is done in for the artifacts of pillars')
- vii. Individual sub structures of the models are made and structured using the home-made paste.

  The raw tendrils of the reed are boiled, ground and mixed with flour to make the glue paste.
- viii. A small weight is used for pressing the structures while binding.
- ix. Then sculpture or design is structured on it by the artisans.

- x. Then final touches are given. For example, in making of a temple partially completed 'Gopuram' (monumental tower) structures are kept in a row for mounting the 'Kalasam' (Generally all Hindu temples have kalasam on their top) and other decorative elements.
- xi. If colouring is done it is done with bright colours and coloured realistically.

#### **UNIQUENESS**

- i. Distinguishing feature of Thanjavur Netti Works is its workmanship. The location of Thanjavur and its religious significance is one of motivating factors behind development of pith industry. The government has recognised the pith work industry as one of the major handicraft symbols. (The sight of architectural masterpiece such as Thanjavur Big Temple (Brihadeeshwara Temple) is inculcated deep inside artisans, brain and therefore it is no surprise that Thanjavur big temple model is one of the most prestigious pith works.
- ii. Good quality pith that is white in colour is used for production. Poor quality pith that is red in colour is not used.
- iii. Pith doesn't require any mould or supporting instruments to create desired shapes unlike metal scriptures. It requires basic tools such as knives, scissors and geometric tools box to mould it.
- iv. Thanjavur Netti work is famous for miniature works of Thanjavur temples and idol making. The finished pith work is generally fixed to a wooden base and covered with glass to protect from dust and moisture. This helps to preserve the works for years. For normal pieces ply wood made stands are used as base, whereas for big and important pieces teak and wood stands are used. Miniatures of rural and urban place are also made, which are decorated with lights. The art pieces made of pith starts at the range of fifty rupees and goes up to lakhs.
- v. The pith is obtained from near Tanjore or Mannargudi and is cut with a long sharp knife into wafers which are curled and pinned into the shapes of white flowers or figures and decorated with glided metal. Orders for garlands made in this manner come from nearly all the districts in the Presidency.

#### **OTHERS**

- The popularity of Netti works of Thanjavur region has resulted in wide customer base.
   Products have been bought by customers from Russia, US, Singapore, Germany,
   Malaysia and a few more foreign countries.
- ii. Thanjavur Pith work is being promoted by, Poompuhar (Tamil Nadu Handicrafts Development Corporation) a state-owned organization. They have various centres throughout the nation. i.e., in Delhi, Chennai, Bangalore, Kolkata, Thanjavur, and many more places in the state of Tamil Nadu. Pith work artisans are encouraged to exhibit their work in these showrooms so as to attract wider customer base.
- iii. Thanjavur Pith works are usually undertaken by families and it is one of the main sources of income in the region of Thanjavur. They are trained and engaged in this business. Knowledge and skill are passed traditionally from one generation to another through 'Guru Shishya' method.

#### **PURPOSE OF THE VISIT**

The students of L.L.M. And to see whether the benefits of the GI registration also benefit the crafters. The crafters craft the Netti Works without the awareness about GI and the benefits of Part B registration. The Netti Works has been conferred GI for its above-mentioned unique characteristics and has been granted with the Part A registration from the IP office, Chennai. Part B registration is for the registration of the authorized users for the specified GI product. As of now, only few families carrying out the crafts has been registered as authorized user for the use of the GI tag for Netti Works. Therefore, the purpose of the visit by the students mainly focuses on creating awareness among the crafters who are the and also among the law students


#### **Observation: The issue of the crafters**

The major issue of the Netti works with GI tag is that the crafters are very low in number and only a few families practice the craft. The demand is more but the manpower and production of the same is less.

#### **ABOUT THANJAVUR PAINTINGS AND GI PROTECTION**



#### **SPECIFICATION:**

Tanjore or Thanjavur painting would consist of one main figure, a deity, with a well-rounded body & almond shaped eye. This figure would be housed in an enclosure created by means of an arch, curtains etc. The painting would be made by the gilded and gem-set technique - a technique where gold leaves & sparkling stones are used to highlight certain aspects of the painting like ornaments, dresses etc. The painting would be bright & colorful and breathtakingly beautiful. The impact in a darkened room is that of a glowing presence. While cost of the paintings would depict the Child Krishna and his various pranks, paintings of other deities were also created.

#### NAME OF THE GEOGRAPHICAL INDICATION & PARTICULARS

Tanjore Art or Tanjore Paintings or Thanjavur Art or Thanjavur Paintings all references to one and the same art form has its origins in paintings in that were contemporary of the medieval ages.

Thanjavur paintings are a unique painting made by Gem-set technique, where sparkling stones (Precious and Semi-Precious) and gilded gold leaves were extensively employed to create a comprehensive canvas portraying, round shaped figures and almond eyes in glorification of presiding deities like Lord Krishna and others. Thanjavur paintings are painted with a purpose and have a religious leaning and the secular art is restricted and limited to the portrait of king's and patrons. The composition of the Thanjavur painting is highly stylized with strict observance of iconography giving no room for innovation and experimentation. On the hole an aesthetic rigidity and ergonomic appeal marked the passage of Thanjavur paintings for more than three hundred years of life of Thanjavur painting. The figures are static and stiff consisting one main figure in complete dominance of the paintings, other figure usually the attendants, devotees and spouses of the main figure or in miniscule and the main figure always set as plump and robust and its seems that the painters of Thanjavur paintings have no leanings for slim people.

#### **PURPOSE OF VISIT**

Therefore, the purpose of the visit by the students mainly focuses on creating awareness among the producers who are the manufacturers of Thanjavur paintings and also among the law students.









#### **METHOD OF PRODUCTION**

The making of Thanjavur paintings involves these steps which consist of creation of a base on a cloth pasted over a wooden or plywood base, applying a paste of chalk powder/ zinc oxide, mixed with some water soluble adhesive and using a mild abrasive to smoother the board, the process of image making beginning with, drawing a preliminary sketch of the God on the board decoration of jewelry and apparel with precious, semiprecious and imitation stones followed by semi-relief work with a paste of chalk powder and gum Arabic and pasting gold foil over them and applying the typical colour associated with this school of great Thanjavur painting.

#### In short, the production may be summarized in SEVEN STEPS

STEP 1 Preparing the board to make the painting. STEP 2 Sketching the figure and fixing the stones.

STEP 3 Filling around the stone work with a thin paste mix of gum and chalk powder. Inlay and relief work around the stone setting with a thick mix.

STEP 4 Cleaning the work and fixing the gold foil over the stones and relief work STEP 5 Cutting the gold foil to expose the stone work.

STEP 6 Painting the figures and the background.

STEP 7 Checking for flaws, correcting and fixing the glass and frame.





#### **UNIQUENESS**

- 1. Tanjore or Thanjavur Paintings are the only one of its kind in the world wherein any laborious work is performed on the painting with little use of a paint brush & no two paintings are ever alike.
- 2. It is the one of the few art forms that exists today which employs precious stones and golden flakes extensively for creating figures with static expressions.
- 3. The depiction/description of the main figures in the Tanjore (Thanjavur) paintings are with rounded bodies and almond shaped eyes, lighter color, ornamental Jewelry and ornate dresses in the form of precious stones and glass pieces and such others embedded on them; while the other supporting figures are all minuscule.
- 4. the embellishments made over the basic drawings with precious and semi-precious stones as well as the work at times give a 3D effect on a two-dimensional medium.
- 5. The compositions are highly stylized, although there have been many changes in the manner of production.
- 6. The backgrounds are generally conventionalized e.g., other than arches for a temple, or curtained or borders with repetitive designs, there is no alternative for the stylized effect.
- 7. These paintings were those which for the first time could be moved as they were small in size and portable. Hence, they could be hung on the walls also worshiped. This made them popular for household pooja, as the sastras' allowed only a limited use of icons that had to adhere to strict metrics.

#### **ABOUT THANJAVUR DOLL AND GI PROTECTION:**

Tanjore Dolls (Toys) are the unique creations of artisans, living in the around Tanjore incorporating the concept of the gravitational force, even before and infact very earlier than the period of it discovery made by Sir Issac Newton. The alluvial soil and clay obtained from bank of River Cauvery enhances the utility value of Tanjore Dolls (Toys)to a greater extent and it serves as a weight to pull the dolls (Toys)to stand erect it made flat. Generally, women folk are involved in the making of these Dolls.

The globally acclaimed Tanjore dolls (Toys) are made with plaster of Paris, Wood pulp and, of course, the clay, obtained on river banks of Cauvery. The Tanjore Dolls, which is produced on the bases of gravitational force, used to be produced in pairs i.e. Raja and Rani. The Tanjore dolls (Toys) are said to be attracted the attention of children worldwide, for it comes to be static, when a mischievous child tries to push it, to make it flat. Generally, women folk are involved in the making of these Dolls.

#### THE PROCESS OF DRYING:

The students visited the manufacturers of Thanjavur Doll to know about the GI tagged product in a detailed manner. Here the below doll's head is kept for sun dry at their place.




Fig 2 The sun drying of doll at Thanjavur

#### THE RAW MATERIALS USED:

Plaster of Paris, wood pulp and tuber-flour after goes into the making of present - Tanjore Dolls. The plaster of Paris is grinded well. The plaster of Paris and Paper (Wood) pulb are immersed in the rate of 1:3 along with required ther flour (Sago) and they were bundled into

dough like a "poori" flour. The same is put in the die, meant for producing pattems. The diecast figurine is let to dry in shade for 112 hour. Later on, the die cast figurine is affixed with papers and lettotry for I 1/2 hours.

Then two parts of Dolls (Toys) are fixed and let to dry. After that the doll is given a coat of flour, filling any gap left in the Doll. Later on, clay is added on the bottom. After that is dried, the Doll is painted. After the doll, were given final touching in the plate. The Tanjore Dolls

(Toys) are done only in Raja - Rani pair and in no other motiff, the dolls (Toys) are ever made into. We forced the Dolls (Toys) to lay in ground, they would defiant and stand erect. This is artistic feature which is a subject of surprise. As this Kindle the interest of on lookers, it has eamed supporters in millions. Thanjore Dolls (Toys) are produced at a height ol!\_g{g\_.-The price is Rs.l0/- in mofussil, the rates will go up and in foreign countries, a doll will costs as much as Rs.500/- to 1000/-.

#### **OBSERVATION: THE ISSUES FACED BY THE PRODUCERS:**

The main issue faced by the manufacturers of the thanjavur doll is that they face a lot of difficulties during the rainy season because the dolls primarily rely on the sunlight for drying.

Most of the producers are not even aware about the GI and that the Thanjavur Doll has obtained GI for its unique characteristics. The materials for the making of the doll were imported from Cuddalore. It takes upto one week to make one Thanjavur Doll based on sunlight. And the work is handmade for which GI protection is granted. As per the survey the only concern is that they have no one in the next generation to carry out this art so government funding and initiative to start a course to learn the art will be very useful.

CONCLUSION:
The opportunity provided to the students by TNDALU has served its purpose as a signature
from manufacturer have been obtained for Part B registration for authorized users of the GI

registered Thanjavur Doll. Producers were made aware of the concept of GI protection and
part A registration for the Thanjavur doll. They were also provided with complete information
about the part B registration and consented to do with complete knowledge and signed for the
same. This enable them to benefit from the use of the GI tag on their product when placed for
sale this will increase more producer to cultivate the GI product in the region and obtain part
B registration.

22<sup>nd</sup> - 23<sup>rd</sup> March, 2024

#### **Summary:**

The Students of LL.B (Hons) (Elective A – International Law and IPR, Batch 2021 - 2024) and LL.M. (Intellectual Property Law Department – Batch of 2021 to 2023) from School of Excellence in Law, The Tamil Nadu Dr. Ambedkar Law University embarked on a visit to Tanjore on 22<sup>nd</sup> – 23<sup>rd</sup> March, 2024 as part of the Outreach Programme headed by Prof. Dr. Lucky George (Head of the Department, IPL). The objective of the visit was to conduct an empirical study focused on the Geographical Indication (GI) of various products in Tanjore, namely –

- 1. Thanjavur Veenai
- 2. Thanjavur Art Plates
- 3. Thanjavur Netti Works
- 4. Thanjavur Paintings
- 5. Thanjavur Thalaiyatti Bommai

The purpose of this visit was twofold: firstly, to examine the impact of GI registration on the various products of Tanjore and secondly, to raise awareness among the artisans and craftsman about the significance of GI registration. The aim was also to assess whether the benefits of GI registration extended to the artisans themselves.

The goal was to conduct an empirical study and to explore the impact of GI registration on Tanjore products and raise awareness among artisans about its significance.




#### ABOUT TANJORE VEENAI

Thanjavur, where culture and tradition intertwine seamlessly with craftsmanship and artistry, there exists a musical marvel - the Tanjore Veenai. More than just a musical instrument, it's a testament to centuries of heritage, skill, and passion.

The Thanjavur Musical Instruments Workers Co-operative Cottage Industrial Society Limited submitted an application on July 23, 2010, seeking the Geographical Indications (G.I.) tag for the Tanjore Veenai, in respect of musical instruments falling under Class – 15 & 20. Following this, the Veenai was incorporated into the continually expanding list of Geographical Indications of India in the early months of 2013.

What sets the Thanjavur Veenai apart is its fascinating construction, offering two distinct types: the "Ekantha Veena" and the "Sada Veena." While the former is carved from a single block of wood, the latter is meticulously crafted in three sections, comprising the resonator, neck, and head. This intricate design allows for the seamless execution of melodies across its 24 fixed frets, ensuring the rendition of all ragas with precision. With its seven strings—four for playing and three for drone—the Thanjavur veena showcases a harmonious blend of melody and rhythm. The main bridge, crafted from brass with a subtle curve, lends a characteristic sound to this illustrious instrument, distinguishing it from its counterparts.

Beyond its technical prowess, the Thanjavur Veenai is a work of art in itself. Adorned with hand-painted motifs and meticulously carved details, its elegance and beauty captivate both the eyes and ears of its audience. As the performer, seated crosslegged, delicately manoeuvres the strings with dexterity, the resonant tones of the veena fill the air, transporting listeners to a realm of musical enchantment.

#### BACKGROUND

Veena, one of the three celestial musical instruments referenced since Vedic times alongside the Flute and Mridangam, holds a significant place in Indian culture. Its

association with Saraswathi, the goddess of Art, underscores the paramount importance of the musical instrument.

The current form of the Saraswati Veena, characterized by 24 fixed frets, owes its existence to Raghunatha Nayak, the ruler of Tanjavoor from 1614 to 1632, and his esteemed prime minister and musicologist Govinda Dikshita. Earlier, Veena variants had fewer frets, which were also movable, limiting their range and versatility. Raghunatha Nayak and Govinda Dikshita, introduced 24 fixed frets, known as Mettur, to the instrument, thereby enabling the rendition of all ragas. This innovation marked a pivotal moment in the evolution of the Veena, leading to the emergence of the "Thanjavur Veena."

#### MANUFACTURING PROCESS

The Thanjavur Veena, a timeless symbol of Indian classical music, embodies a tradition that transcends generations. Behind its melodious tones lies a painstaking process of creation, characterized by delicate craftsmanship and a meticulous attention to detail.

#### Raw Material:

The crafting of a Thanjavur Veena begins with the careful selection of wood, predominantly sourced from the Jackwood tree. Occasionally, Rosewood and Champak wood are also utilized. However, the Jackwood tree, particularly from the environs of Thanjavur, is preferred for its superior quality. The wood, harvested from mature Jackwood trees devoid of nodes, undergoes a critical seasoning process lasting at least six months before it's deemed ready for use.

The small gourd shaped part on the left of the veenai was historically made from *Sorakkai* (gourd) which was plucked from the plant in its nascent stage and buried in sand and left to grow. In modern times, the organic gourd has been replaced by papier-mâché or fibre.



#### **Construction:**

The Thanjavur Veena boasts two distinct variants: the "Ekantha Veena" and the "Sada Veena." The former is crafted from a single block of wood, while the latter comprises three sections—resonator, neck, and head—joined together.

The design of the Veena is crafted, comprising a large functional resonator (Kudam), a small table-like wooden bridge (Kudurai), a tapering hollow neck (Dandi), and seven strings. The resonator is hollowed out of a log, with specific dimensions ensuring optimal acoustics. It is affixed to a neck adorned with 24 metal frets, while an ornamental dragon's head (the Yali) adds a touch of elegance.

A wooden bridge, crowned with a convex brass plate, serves as the platform for the strings. Intricate rosettes, once fashioned from ivory but now commonly made from plastic or horn, adorn the resonator, enhancing its aesthetic appeal.



Beyond its structural integrity lies the artistic embellishment that characterizes the Thanjavur Veena. Delicate woodwork, featuring depictions of gods and goddesses, floral motifs, or avian imagery, adorns the instrument's body, adding an elegant touch to its appearance.

#### OBSERVATION

The production of a Thanjavur Veena is indeed a labour of love, blending technical precision with artistic expression. As each Veena takes shape, it becomes not just an instrument, but a melodic masterpiece that resonates with the soul of Indian classical music.

In our visit to Thanjavur, we had an opportunity to witness the creation of this masterpiece firsthand. We met Mr. V. Chinnappa, the founder of Thanjavur Veenai Works, one among the 80 families that are presently in business of making the Veenai.

As we toiled around the small workshop gazing at the artisans indulged in their work, amidst the rhythmic tapping of chisels and the fragrant aroma of freshly worked wood, Mr. V. Chinnappa provided us with exposition about the crafting of the Veenai. Occasionally, he would stray away from the topic of Veenai to discuss

about different hardships that he confronts in his occupation. Through various questions and answers we were able to weave his life story.

We were told that Mr. Chinappa has been in this craft since his childhood, learning from his guru for a meagre pay. From the humble beginning, Chinappa has been able to take the business online and today has clients across the globe. While the craft has certainly found its appreciation, Chinappa finds it difficult to sustain the craft just for the sake of tradition. He voices his concern that he has no next generation of volunteers to learn the craft and take the tradition forward. He even candidly expressed that he has no incentive to preserve the art.

#### CONCLUSION

Our encounter with Mr. V. Chinnappa and the artisans at Thanjavur Veenai Works offered a poignant glimpse into the life of the artisans that are striving to keep the art of crafting Veenai alive. While the artistry and dedication to tradition were palpable, so too were the challenges faced in sustaining this time-honored craft. Mr. Chinnappa's candid reflections underscored the urgent need for concerted efforts to preserve and nurture such invaluable cultural legacies, ensuring they continue to enrich our lives and inspire generations to come. As we bid farewell to the workshop, we departed with a renewed appreciation for the profound significance of the Thanjavur Veena and a deepened resolve to support its enduring legacy.

#### ABOUT THANJAVUR ART PLATES

Thanjavur art plates, crafted by artisans in Thanjavur, are renowned for their exquisite beauty and intricate style, often gracing elegant homes. Made primarily from copper and brass, these plates feature motifs intricately adorned with silver embellishments. The craft extends beyond plates to include a diverse range of items such as bowls, napkin rings, powder boxes, and wall hangings, showcasing extensive product diversification. During our visit, we observed artisans creating mementos for the Tamil Nadu Government, showcasing the versatility and relevance of their craft. A distinguishing characteristic of this art lies in the skillful engraving and embossing of figures and images onto metal, particularly silver, demonstrating the artisans' mastery of technique. Tanjore Art Plates are celebrated for their exquisite craftsmanship and unique tri-metal work, combining copper, brass, and silver in a manner exclusive to Thanjavur, setting them apart as timeless treasures of artistic ingenuity.

#### METHOD OF PRODUCTION

#### Materials Required:

1.Brass sheet, 2.Wax, 3.Lead, 4.Mold, 5.Copper or silver foil, 6.Beeswax. 7."Kungilium" (a substance mixed with beeswax), 8.Decorative brass rivets, 9.Hydrochloric acid, 10.Soap powder

**Cutting Brass Sheet:** Using dividers, chisels, and a hammer, the brass sheet of 18 or gauge is cut into the required shape and size. The plates are typically divided into six or eight portions.

Creating Wax Figures and Designs: Figures and designs are sculpted in wax, then cast with lead to form the primary mold. A thin brass sheet, precisely fitting the mold, acts as the final detailed mold for finishing work.

**Shaping Copper or Silver Foil:** Thin copper or silver foil, typically 42 gauge, is cut into the desired shape and fixed over the lead mold. It's then gently beaten with a rubber shell and hammer until it conforms to the mold's shape. The foil is then placed over the brass mold, which bears minute details of the image, and beaten gently until it captures even the smallest details.

Embossing and Detailing: The foil is inverted, and a mixture of beeswax and "Kungilium" is heated and filled into the depths of the relief image to achieve a flat surface on the backside. The embossed foil is then secured with minute decorative brass rivets.

**Polishing:** Finally, the completed piece is polished using hydrochloric acid and soap powder to enhance its shine and overall appearance.

#### **OBSERVATION**

Observing the production process at the visited establishment, it became apparent that artisans' salaries are contingent upon the number of pieces they produce, leading to income instability. However, it was noted that despite being privately operated, the artisans were eligible for social security benefits due to their Government undertaking status. Reflecting on this, it seems clear that extending similar benefits to all producers of Geographical Indication (GI) products could significantly improve artisans' livelihoods and sustain traditional arts. Such governmental support would not only stabilize incomes but also contribute to the long-term viability of these crafts, fostering an environment where cultural heritage thrives while providing artisans with dignity, financial security, and a pathway to economic empowerment.

#### **ABOUT**

Thanjavur Netti, also known as Sholapith, is indeed a fascinating traditional craft form originating from the Thanjavur district in Tamil Nadu, India. Artisans in this region are known for their exquisite craftsmanship in creating artifacts using the pith obtained from the hydrophyte plant Aeschynomene Aspera. Aeschynomene Aspera is an aquatic plant considered a minor weed of rice paddies. It grows in wetlands, such as lagoons, tanks, lakes, and swampy grasslands, including river beds in Thanjavur. The plant's stem contains pith, which forms the core and is the material used for crafting.

The pith obtained from Aeschynomene Aspera is dried and processed to create artifacts. Good quality pith is pure white, soft, and free from cracks, while poor quality pith may have a reddish core, hard bark, and numerous nodes. Due to its delicate

nature and brittleness, careful handling is required during crafting. Artifacts made from Thanjavur Netti resemble marble or ivory carvings, exhibiting an elegant shine. However, they are fragile and prone to breakage, so they are often preserved inside glass boxes for protection. The simplicity of production and the exquisite beauty of the finished products contribute to the enduring appeal of Thanjavur Netti craftsmanship.

#### METHOD OF PRODUCTION

- 1. **Harvesting and Preparation:** Netti, the special variety of pith, is obtained from lakes across Thanjavur, Pudukottai, and Mannargudi. Only good quality pith, which is pure white, soft, and free from cracks, is selected for production. The pith is carefully harvested, boiled, and dried in the sun to prepare it for crafting.
- 2. **Designing:** Once dried, the pith is cut to size, and a pencil drawing is inscribed on it to outline the design. Artisans use blueprints or photos as references for intricate designs.
- 3. **Carving:** The rough carving of the design is done initially, followed by finer detailing using blunt chisels and small knives. Artisans meticulously carve the pith to bring out intricate patterns and designs.
- 4. **Polishing:** After carving, the artifact is polished using sandpaper to achieve a smooth surface texture.
- 5. **Assembly:** Carved pieces are assembled together using adhesive to form the final art piece. Care is taken to ensure that the pieces fit seamlessly and securely.
- 6. **Painting (optional):** Some pith works are painted with watercolors to add color and make them more vibrant and attractive.
- 7. **Mounting:** The finished pith work is typically mounted on a wooden base, and glass is used to cover and protect it from dust and moisture. Plywood or teakwood stands are used as bases depending on the size and importance of the piece.
- 8. **Finishing Touches:** Miniatures of Thanjavur temples, idols, rural and urban scenes are made with meticulous attention to detail. Some pieces are decorated with lights to enhance their appeal.
- 9. **Pricing:** The price range for Thanjavur Netti works varies depending on the size, intricacy, and detailing of the piece, starting from fifty rupees for small figures and going up to lakhs for intricate designs.



#### **TOOLS:**

- 1. **Sola Pith Plant (Netti):** This is the primary raw material used to make the miniature art pieces.
- 2. **Long Knife (Kathi):** Used for carving the pith into the required shape and size. It helps in initial shaping and cutting.
- 3. **Small Knife:** Utilized for carving minute details of the design. It allows artisans to add intricate patterns and fine lines to the artwork.
- 4. **Carborundum Stone (Sana Kal):** This abrasive stone is used to sharpen the knives, ensuring they remain sharp for precise carving.

#### Additional tools may include:

- 5. **Scissors:** Used for sculpting precise detailing and various combinations, especially for intricate designs.
- 6. **Geometry Box:** Helps in achieving precise measurements and details, ensuring accuracy in the final product.
- 7. **Glass Case:** Used to cover and protect the finished pith artifact, preserving it from dust and moisture.
- 8. **Glass Cutter:** Used to make shallow scores in glass, facilitating controlled breaking for shaping or fitting purposes.
- 9. **Silicon Carbide Combination Stone:** Utilized for sharpening knives, chisels, plane iron blades, and other cutting tools, ensuring they maintain their

sharpness during carving.

10. **Home-made Glue/Paste:** Used for assembling carved pieces together and for attaching the finished artwork to its base. It provides a secure bond without using harmful chemicals.

#### **PROCESS:**



- 1. **Identification and Collection:** The pith plant is recognized by the shallow layer of leaves floating on marshy water, typically at a depth of two to six feet. Pith collectors gather the reed, which grows up to 4-5 feet and becomes dry when the water recedes. The collected reeds are dried and sold as sticks of 2 to 3 feet.
- 2. **Preparation of Raw Material:** The brown cover of the Hydrophyte (Sholapith) is sliced and removed using a suitable knife. Only ivory-colored pith of standard quality is selected for further processing.
- 3. **Slicing and Structuring:** Using a knife as the primary tool, the pith is sliced into equal dimensions with meticulous detailing to ensure uniformity. The slices are then cut, sliced, and sub-structured according to the specifications of the desired artifact. For example, for a sculpture of 'Nandi the bull,' the broad outlines of Nandi are designed on the pith rows, which are then sliced into equal dimensions to create multiple 'Nandi' structures.
- 4. **Assembly:** Individual sub-structures of the models are assembled and structured using homemade paste made from boiled, ground raw tendrils of the reed mixed with flour. A small weight is used to press the structures

together while binding.

- 5. **Sculpting and Designing:** Artisans sculpt or design intricate patterns and details on the assembled structures using knives and other carving tools.
- 6. **Final Touches:** Final touches are given to the artwork, such as mounting 'Gopuram' structures in a row for adding decorative elements like 'Kalasam' (typically found atop Hindu temple towers). If coloring is required, bright and realistic colors are applied to enhance the visual appeal of the artwork.



#### **OBSERVATION:**

One could observe the intricate artistry involved in crafting Thanjavur Netti. Artisans diligently work with the delicate material derived from the hydrophyte plant Aeschynomene Aspera – Sola Pith or Netti.

The artisans are able to sustain the craft of netti works thanks to the low investment required in acquiring the raw material. With the abundant availability of the Netti plant in the region's wetlands, the cost of obtaining the pith for crafting remains minimal. This advantageous situation allows artisans to maximize their profits while keeping their production costs low.

Moreover, the prestigious recognition of Thanjavur Netti with a GI tag in 2020 has significantly bolstered its popularity and marketability. As a result, artisans can command premium prices for their works, capitalizing on the increased demand driven by the GI tag's endorsement

#### **ABOUT**

Tanjore paintings are a popular form of South Indian painting. They are characterized by their rich colors, simple composition, and gold foil. They often feature intricate depictions of Hindu gods and goddesses, saints, and deities. In Thanjavur paintings one can see the influence of Deccani, Vijayanagara, Maratha and even European or Company styles of painting. Essentially serving as devotional icons, the subjects of most paintings are Hindu gods, goddesses, and saints.

Tanjore paintings are also called 'Palagai Padam,' which translates to painting on a wooden plank. The art form developed from the mural art form, and the iconography of these paintings is derived from Shaivite and Vaishnavite traditions.

#### HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The painting style originated and flourished here in the 16th and 17th centuries. the origin of this classical painting style is linked to the Vijayanagara empire (1336 a.d. to 1646 a.d.), including the areas of Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, and Andhra pradesh. The rulers of Vijayanagara were patrons of art and culture. The roots of this south Indian art form are linked to the mural art of the Vijayanagara empire.

Tanjore Painting was first used for decorating the doors and walls of homes, palaces, and temples in Thanjavur. The interior walls of the palaces were also painted with depictions of various events like a coronation, battle victories, and other achievements of the rulers.

In 1676, Thanjavur was captured by Ekoji, the half-brother of Chatrapati Shivaji, on behalf of Adil Shah of Bijapur and established the Maratha rule in the region. The Maratha rulers were great patrons of art and artists. During the reign of Serfoji II in Thanjavur, the Thanjavur painting style flourished into its current form.

Later the Chettiar community encouraged Tanjore Painting with Shaivite themes. The monastery in Koviloor, Tamil Nadu, has a huge Tanjore Painting depicting the lives of all 63 Shaivaite Saints or Nayanmars and 64 miracles of Lord Shiva (Thiruvilaiyadal Puranam). Thanjavur's Bhimarajagoswami monastery has a large Tanjore Painting of 108 temples of Lord Vishnu. Britishers who came to the city of Thanjavur also patronized the South Indian art forms and encouraged Tanjore Painting style.



Initially work begins by preparing the wooden board of required size and cardboard is placed over the board after the cardboard is pasted to the wooden board, Cotton fabric is then stretched and pasted on the board using an indigenous gum. After the fabric is attached well to the board, the process of coating the cloth begins. Then cloth is coated with the paste, which is prepared by mixing chalk powder and tamarind seed powder. This paste is applied over the canvas to multiple coats.

This coated area is then rubbed with a smoothing stone and emery sheet to obtain a surface with mild sheen and good texture. Coating of the cloth board helps prevent the painting from damage caused by moisture and heat. After the canvas is ready, the painter draws the Sketch over the canvas using the templates of religious themes. The template will be in the form of a tracing sheet with pinpricks on the outlines. This tracing sheet is placed on top of the cloth board and dusted with charcoal dust. Molding paste is made by mixing a quantity of a paste made of chalk powder and glue

with Gold paint and water. It is then filled in a squeezing bottle to create the relief work. To give a fine detailing even fine brushes are used.

In brush, the first layer of the paste is applied to create a raised effect for the chosen areas of the work. Once this layer is dry, finer details are painted using the same paste to create raised patterning. They are pasted using the glue. Once dried, the embossed areas are covered with gold leaf. Gold leaf work is made by using gold foil, a thin gold foil is placed on an embossed area and the foil is then cut to shape. Glue is then applied to the back side of the foil and it is then applied over the embossed area.

Using the pointed back of a paintbrush, the foil is pressed down to reveal the embossed details. In this manner, all the embossed areas are covered with gold leaf. Painting is then enhanced by pasting the Kundan/ gems or precious stones along with a mirror in the border. Colors are then painted in several coats over the design and it is allowed to dry. A fine outlining is done for features. The painting, once it is complete, is framed using teakwood with glass on top.

#### **OBSERVATION**

We had the opportunity to meet Mr. Sambhaji, the direct descendant of king Sarfoji, who was one of the leading artisans of Thanjavur paintings. We went to the workshop of the painters and observed the process of making the Thanjavur painting. There was also a brief discussion and interaction with Mr Sambhaji. The following are some of the excerpts from the interaction:

- 1. What unique feature did the Thanjavur painting had in the beginning and lost now?
  - Mr. Sambhaji: Originally, the paintings were studded with real gems from Jaipur. However, the painters started to use coloured stones or glass pieces to adorn it because of the cost and rarity of the gems.
- How long will it take to complete a Thanjavur painting?
   Mr. Sambhaji: That depends on the number of artisans working on the painting.
   Normally it would take a month or more to complete the entire painting. Also,

the weather plays a major role in the work. Also certain parts like the eyes of the Gods and Goddesses have to be drawn only on auspicious occasions.

3. Does the GST exemption apply to the Thanjavur painting as it is applicable for the Veena?

Mr. Sambhaji: No, but we have applied for including the painting under the GST exemption and the district administration is also earnestly working for the same.

4. What is the price range for the paintings?Mr.Sambhaji: The price varies from 3000 rupees to 5,00,000 rupees.

#### **ABOUT**

Thanjavur dolls, also referred to as Thanjavur bommai or Thanjavur thalayatti bommai, are traditional Indian figurines originating from Thanjavur, a city located in the southern state of Tamil Nadu. These dolls are commonly crafted from terracotta or wood and are adorned with intricate, colorful paintings that often depict mythological figures, deities, and historical personalities. They hold significant cultural importance and are utilized both as decorative pieces and in religious ceremonies. Thanjavur dolls are celebrated for their exquisite craftsmanship, embodying the rich artistic heritage of the region. Originating from Thanjavur's cultural legacy, these dolls were initially fashioned for religious and cultural practices, finding utility in traditional ceremonies, festivals, and rituals. Their popularity subsequently expanded, transforming them into cherished artifacts and household decorations, enhancing the ambiance of homes and temples alike. Crafted with meticulous attention to detail, skilled artisans painstakingly sculpt and hand-paint each doll, resulting in distinctive features, vibrant hues, and intricate embellishments.

## METHOD OF PRODUCTION

## Material Required:

- 1. Terracotta or Wood
- 2. Plaster of Paris
- 3. Sculpting and Carving Tools
- 4. Paints (acrylic or oil-based)
- 5. Brushes
- 6. Adhesive (paper glue)

- 7. Decorative Elements (beads, sequins, fabric)
- 8. Protective Coating (optional)
- 9. Gold Foil (optional)

## **Kneading Process**

The process of crafting Thanjavur dolls involves shaping plaster of Paris, akin to kneading dough for roti. However, achieving the appropriate consistency for plaster of Paris, crucial for creating molds, differs from kneading dough.

## Molding

Artisans carefully select or create molds tailored to the specific size and shape requirements of the Thanjavur doll they aim to produce. These molds, varying in complexity, are meticulously prepared, ensuring a smooth surface to avoid imperfections transferring onto the doll. Once ready, the chosen material, such as plaster of Paris, is meticulously pressed into the mold cavity, ensuring uniform distribution to capture intricate details. After allowing adequate time for the material to set or dry, the molded piece is gently removed from the mold, and any excess material is trimmed or smoothed to achieve the desired shape.

## **Drying Process**

Once the doll is molded, it is left undisturbed in the mold to begin the initial drying process. During this time, the moisture in the material starts to evaporate, gradually firming up the doll's structure. plaster of Paris, may typically take a minimum of 2 days for the material to dry completely and attain the desired hardness.



Once the doll is deemed sufficiently dry, it is carefully removed from the mold to continue drying further. Depending on the size and thickness of the doll, as well as environmental conditions, additional drying time may be required before proceeding with further detailing and finishing.

## Assembling the doll

Once the individual pieces have dried, they are carefully removed from the molds. Artisans then begin assembling the various components of the doll, such as the body, limbs, and head, using adhesive or other suitable methods to ensure they securely bond together. Attention is paid to aligning the pieces properly to achieve the desired posture and stance of the doll.

#### **Detailing and Ornamentation**

With the basic structure of the doll assembled, artisans proceed to add finer details and ornamentation to enhance its appearance. Facial features such as eyes, nose, and mouth are carefully sculpted or painted to give the doll its character and expression. Elaborate clothing, jewellery, and accessories are added to adorn the doll, reflecting traditional attire and cultural motifs. Intricate patterns and designs are meticulously hand-painted onto the doll's surface, using vibrant colors to bring out its aesthetic

appeal. With the request or requirement of the customer the Artisans are also use the Golden Foil in the detailing process.



## Final inspection



Once the doll has been fully assembled and detailed, a final inspection is conducted to ensure that it meets all specifications and requirements. The completed Thanjavur doll is then carefully packaged and presented, ready to be showcased as a beautiful work of Art.

#### **OBSERVATION**

During a field visit to the manufacturing site of the GI-tagged Thanjavur doll, a comprehensive understanding of the product was gained. It was noted that artisans undergo training facilitated by

government programs. Despite the product receiving GI protection, its market price remained consistent. However, it was concerning to find that many artisans were unfamiliar with the Part B certificate. During the visit, assistance was extended to two artisans in filing applications for the Part B certificate. This underscores the necessity for heightened awareness and support mechanisms to enable artisans to fully leverage the benefits of GI protection and certification processes.

Furthermore, it was observed that the product fetches a higher price in the market compared to what manufacturers receive from intermediaries or resellers. The manufacturers expressed challenges faced during the monsoon season, citing difficulties in ensuring proper drying of the dolls, which impacts sales. Therefore, it is imperative for the government to provide assistance to doll artisans during such periods of hardship. Additionally, integrating them into social security schemes could offer them much-needed support and stability. These measures would contribute significantly to sustaining the livelihoods of Thanjavur doll artisans and preserving this culturally significant craft.

#### CONCLUSION

Our journey through the traditional crafts of Thanjavur has provided us with profound insights into the intricate processes and challenges faced by artisans in preserving these age-old traditions. From the laborious crafting of Thanjavur Veena to the delicate artistry of Thanjavur Netti, the rich heritage of Thanjavur paintings, the graceful movements of Thanjavur dancing dolls, and the ornate beauty of Thanjavur art plates, each craft reflects a unique blend of technical precision and artistic expression.

The opportunity provided to the students by TNDALU has served its purpose as our interactions with artisans shed light on the passion and dedication embedded in their work, as well as the hurdles they encounter in sustaining their crafts. While the awarding of Geographical Indication (GI) tags has elevated the recognition and market value of these crafts, challenges such as income instability and lack of awareness about certification processes persist.



Furthermore, we successfully enrolled two artisans for Part B registration, enabling them to be granted authorized user status for the Geographical Indication (GI) registered Thanjavur Thallaiyaati Bommai.

Prior to their enrollment, we ensured they were well-informed about the concept of GI and necessity of Part A registration for the Thanjavur Thallaiyaati Bommai. Subsequently, we provided them with comprehensive details regarding Part B registration, which they fully understood and consented to before signing

up. This pivotal step allows them to harness the advantages of the GI tag on their products, amplifying their market appeal and ensuring recognition of their

craftsmanship when offered for sale.

It is evident that governmental support, including extending social security benefits and providing assistance during periods of hardship, is crucial for ensuring the long-term viability of these crafts and the livelihoods of the artisans. By implementing policies that prioritize the well-being and empowerment of artisans, we can safeguard our cultural heritage and foster an environment where traditional crafts thrive for generations to come. Through concerted efforts and collective action, we can uphold the legacy of Thanjavur's craftsmanship and honor the profound cultural significance embodied in each masterpiece crafted with love and dedication.



# REPORT ON THE ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED FROM 2-4-2024 TO 8-4-2024

DAY 1(02.04.2024)

On that auspicious day, 53 Volunteers along with 2 faculties reached the Camp Venue (48 km from the University). NSS team went throughout the village, introduced their presence and invited all the natives to make use of our camp activities. Inauguration of this special camp was headed by Dr. A. SENTHIL KUMAR, NSS Program officer, The Tamil Nadu Dr Ambedkar Law University and NSS Faculty co-ordinator Dr. S. THIRUMAL. The dignitary inaugurated the session and threw lights on Importance of rendering service to the society. With his Energetic Words, the thoughts of the volunteers are changed and enlightened.



## DAY 2 (03/04/2024)

The day started with organic farming. All the volunteers of the NSS team assembled by 6 AM in the morning. Initially the land surface was leveled up by the students with proper equipment and all the non-bio degradable wastes in the land are removed. Then they with proper care and guidance, added manure to the coconut crops.

## CAMPUS AND VILLAGE CLEANING

The task of the day was to clean up the School and Temple Campus around Kasuva village. NSS team of 53 students along with Faculty Coordinator prepared themselves for cleaning activities. All were provided with hand cloves and garbage bags and divided themselves into teams. Each team took control over that area with proper intervals. All the 12 Teams coordinated well among themselves and collected each and every plastic wastes like wrappers, cups, bottles, polythene bags etc. The cleaning process was entirely carried over around the campus of Sevalaya foundation and around the Temple. In the end, our team collected 50 kgs of plastic and non-bio degradable wastes and they were all properly disposed by the volunteers. The great success of this cleaning camp was that the villagers also supported us. On seeing our camp, the villagers promised that they will reduce the usage of such plastics in their lives.

## DAY 3 (04/04/2024)

The day started happily with positive energy. Volunteers assembled by 6 AM in the morning and started performing organic farming. Volunteers continued the work of applying natural fertilizer to every Coconut Crop. On completion of the work, nearly 50 coconut crops are nourished with natural fertilizer and land surface was leveled up properly and removed all the non bio degradable waste.

## COMPETITION FOR THE OLD AGE PEOPLES

NSS volunteers arranged for a Rangoli, singing and musical chairs competition and invited the old age peoples and workers of Sevalaya foundation to take part in the competition. In mates old age home at Sevalaya Foundation took part in competition by depicting their arts in paper and by their singing. Finally out of 50 participants, Judges adjudged the winners.

Following that, In the evening a special session was conducted by Mr. Yoga acharya Prabhakaran, Yoga expert. In the health benefit session, the speaker emphasized the importance of Yoga in human life and also educated the audience about the health hazards that arise now a days. He also taught the audience some breathing exercises and also added few tips for healthy flow of life. The ceremony ended with our SOEL NSS team's cultural events.



Day 4 (05/04/2024)

The day began with organic farming and natural fertilizer was added to each and every coconut crop and at end of 3 days work, NSS team successfully leveled up the area, cleaned all wastes and nourished 100 coconut crops in total with natural fertilizer and manure. Volunteers were interested in doing all such tasks and they were proficient enough in handling all sort of agricultural equipment.

In the evening all the 53 volunteers with faculty coordinators reached the Sai University for the 2nd lecture of the S. Krishnamurti Endowment Lecture in Law Series. The series of Public Lectures has been designed to spur critical thinking and engagement with the law and legal principles. The second lecture will be delivered by Mr. Sriram Panchu, Senior Advocate and Mediator, one of India's leading lawyers and foremost legal experts.



## DAY 5 (06/04/2024)

Day 5 the team assembled early in the morning. Volunteers carried out their organic farming work, the next task assigned was to plough the waste land and make it suitable for cultivation. It was an area of around 3500 sqt land filled with weeds and wastes and stagnant water. NSS team volunteers with proper equipment, removed all the weeds in the land and 22 drained out all the stagnant water. Around 30% of the task was completed by the volunteers on that day.

On this day, SOEL NSS Volunteers arranged for Drawing, speech and Essay writing competition among the students of MAHAKAVI BHARATHIYAAR MATRICULATION SCHOOL, KASUVA. 100 students of the school who were permanently residing in Sevalaya foundation campus under the category of Orphan, Destitute, Below poverty Line are invited for this competition. Speech Competition in the theme of My Dream, My ambition and Essay writing competition in thetheme of My favourite leader, My favourite Teacher and

Drawing competition was conducted for the students and best out of each event are selected as winners.



Following that in the evening the special session was taken by the advocate KAVITHA GANDHI, senior councel practicing in all Courts in Thiruvallur District gave the lecture on "Women safety". The session was useful and was completely filled with all sorts of legal information which was required for girls as well as for the boys. It was an interactive session where the speaker clarified all doubts of audience. On the reflection of the topic the volunteers done the drama based on the women safety The ceremony ended with our SOEL NSS team's cultural events.
